After announcing the refusal of the company to handle government cable ssages except upon prepayment or to carry messages originating outside of the United States at reduced gov-ernment rates, the statement said it had been the uniform policy of the government to allow the landing of cables only on condition that the United States should be entitled to enjoy the same privileges with regard to the control and use of such lines as were exercised by foreign

It was obvious, the statement added, that the United States could not be expected to allow the Western Union Company, a United States corporation, to charge for government messages twice the rates charged the British and other governments.
