## YESTERDAY'S VOTING MEANS THE RETURN OF LIBERALS TO POWER

Unionists' Net Gains to Date Number 29 — Burns Wins, Joe Martin is Elected—Beresford Sweeps Portsmouth, and Bonar Law is Returned—Will Crooks, Mr. Jebb and Hamar Greenwood Among the Slain

London, Jan. 17.—At the conclusion of today's polling in the general elections, the parties stood as follows:  
Unionists, 92; Liberals, 77; Laborites, 16; Nationalists, 13. Net gains for the Unionists, 29.

The government fared much better today than their most ardent supporters expected. The Unionists gained 19 seats, the Liberals, 4 and the Laborites, 1, making a net gain for the Unionists for the day of 14, one less than they gained at fewer elections on Saturday.

This practically assures the return of the Liberals to power with a fair majority, for among the places still to poll are those in Scotland and Wales which are always solid Liberal.

London, Jan. 17.—There cannot be said to have been many surprises today. So expected that John Burns, president of the local government board, would be defeated in the Battersea division of Battersea and Clapham, but pessimism has been present in every election since Burns has been a candidate.  
Other state officials who had to fight for their seats and were successful were Augustine Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, and C. E. Hobhouse, financial secretary to the treasury in Bristol, and Dr. T. J. Macnamara, secretary to the admiralty, in Camberwell. Their majority were considerably reduced.

In fact this happened all through the country, the huge majorities secured in 1906, showing big reductions in almost all cases. Indeed, many of the Liberals who became members of the House of Commons by the grace of the landslide that year, have been sent back to private life. Among them is Hamar Greenwood, a Canadian, who represented York, and was considered a prominent candidate for high office.

Another Canadian, Joseph Martin, former premier of British Columbia, was more successful, winning the seat for St. Pancras, East.  
Other prominent members defeated included L. G. Chiozza Money, the apostle of free trade, who lost his seat for North Paddington, and Will Crooks, the Labor leader, for Woolwich; Sir H. Robson, the Liberal candidate for North Kensington failed to get a majority, as did also Sir John Gort, an ex-minister and at one time a member of the Fourth Party, whose leading spirits were A. J. Ballour and Lord Randolph Churchill.

On the other side, Lord R. Cecil and G. Stewart Bowles, who ran as free trade Unionists, failed in the attempt to oust Philip Snowden, the Labor leader, and Sir Thomas Barclay, at Blackburn.  
The Unionist leaders, who ran today, included A. J. Balfour, Sir William Bull, Walter Hume Long and Sir William Bull. Sir William being the man who caused a sensation by his fight with the Labor leader, Sir William Bull, a hickler at Hammersmith held their seats by increased majorities.

## BIG INCREASE IN I. C. R. BUSINESS IN ST. JOHN

Advance All Along the Line is Shown in Annual Report of L. R. Ross — Shows That St. John is Progressing—The Figures.

Eloquent evidence of St. John's progress during the last eight years can be gathered from the annual statement printed above of L. R. Ross, terminal superintendent of the I. C. R. and C. P. R., showing the business handled here by the government railway during last year. The statement shows a very gratifying increase in freight tonnage, freight earnings and ticket earnings. A comparative statement of the grain handled through the I. C. R. elevator shows a total of 1,431,176 bushels for 1909 as compared with 722,214 bushels in 1908. Mr. Ross expects that this season will see from 2,500,000 to 3,000,000 bushels handled.

Discussing his annual statement with a Telegraph representative last night, Mr. Ross explained the decrease in the number of cars handled during 1909 compared with the number for 1908 by the fact that the old time freight cars of from fifteen to twenty-five ton capacity, are gradually being superseded by cars of a forty ton capacity. It will be noticed by reference to the statement that although the number of cars handled in 1909 was smaller there was an increase of 41,920 tons in the quantity of freight carried, and of \$17,862.63 in the freight earnings. In passenger business there is also an increase of \$2,431.16.

The statement herewith presented represents only the earnings of and work done for the I. C. R. The ticket earnings of the Canadian Pacific through St. John are almost twice as large as those of the Intercolonial, while the freight tonnage and the number of cars handled at the Mill street terminals for the Canadian Pacific are almost as large as those of the government road. This, of course, is exclusive of the enormous business handled on the west side. The work for both railways at the Mill street terminals is all done by the one staff.

Speaking of this vast increase, Mr. Ross called attention to the fact that during last summer the maintenance department of the I. C. R. added track room for 300
