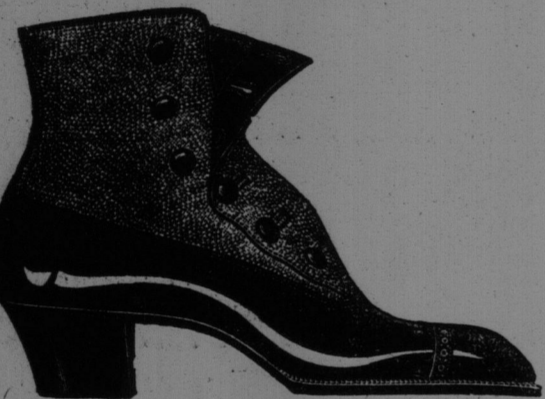

The Bear River News says that ship carpenters being rather scarce there just at present a number of men arrived from Meteghan the first of this week to work on the schooner B. B. Hardwick.

A dispatch received Monday at Halifax by Al. W. Wilson, the ventriloquist of the McLaughlin Company, stated that his residence at Chelsea had been destroyed, with all the furniture, but that his wife and family were safe. Mr. Wilson lived in Central avenue, near the city hall. His loss was partially covered by insurance—Halifax Chronicle.

Because Dr. J. V. Anglin, Supt. of the Provincial Hospital for Nervous Diseases dismissed Mark Carey, an employe, the latter retained Daniel Mullin, K. C., to take action against the institution. Dr. Anglin maintains that he had very good reasons for his action. The hospital commissioners have approved of his course.

SAYS HE GOT THEM IN ST. JOHN. A Boston dispatch of April 13, says: A suspicious-looking man was taken into custody this morning by the Quebec police on information that he was trying to dispose of diamond rings for small sums. He gave the name of Jennings and later as Billingham and Constable. He has on his person three diamond rings which he said were given him in St. John. He is now in jail.

BIG FRUIT CARGO COMING TO CANADA. Fremona Bound For Montreal With Over 18,000,000 Oranges and Lemons (Montreal Star.) Rejoice ye small boy and ye youthful girlie, and be merry, for the needed fruit to tinge the circus fluid is now affording in a tight little craft on the billowy main, bound for Montreal, and before morning day comes round again will be safe and sound in port.

On board of the steamship 'Fremona' which, as previously reported, is the cargo steamer, sailed from Sorrento on April 5, is one of the largest fruit cargoes ever despatched from Italy, being made up of 43,200 packages from Messina, Sicily, and 22,810 from Sorrento, Italy, together a total of 66,010 packages, all of oranges and lemons.

Montreal is a fruit centre in America, the annual cargoes of Mediterranean grown oranges and lemons which come to this port have been increasing year by year, until now this city is noted for its spring auctions, attracting dealers and buyers from various parts of Canada and the United States. The development of this trade has been remarkable. In the good old days, oranges and lemons were brought out by sailing ships and were used only in hot weather. The cargoes were not very large, and it required a long time to dispose of the lemons. Now there is a steady demand for the fruit at all times in the year and the retailers will dispose of any amount each week from three hundred boxes upwards. There is need for the lemon throughout the year for cooking purposes, for use with fish and oysters, for the garnishing of dishes. Naturally, too, there is a big need for them in the harmless and refreshing lemonade, to say nothing of their actual necessity as the ground work of the seductive 'John Collins'.

If all the boxes of fruit now on board they would reach in an unbroken line to a couple of miles beyond Vaudreuil. If the fruit should be removed from the boxes and placed in line the other end would find a resting place in Detroit, a distance of almost seven hundred miles. Converted into lemonade and not made too tart, the juice of the fruit would form a lake of sufficient magnitude to float the giant 'Mauretania'.

WORK WILL START ON MONUMENT AT ONCE

Sec'y, D. R. Jack of Champlain Monument Committee Has Sent \$1500 to Hamilton McCarthy as a First Deposit

It is probable that work on the Champlain monument will be commenced very shortly as the committee have accepted the proposal of the sculptor to pay over to him the money now on hand in order that he may proceed. The secretary, D. R. Jack, has sent to Mr. McCarthy a cheque for \$1,500, which is the amount already paid. The dominion government has promised a grant of \$5,000, the provincial government, \$1,500, and the common council \$1,000, which make a total of \$8,000. This leaves \$1,000 still to be collected. A portion of this amount is already subscribed but not paid in. Following is a copy of the letter sent to the sculptor by Mr. Jack: 'St. John, N. B., April 14, '08. Hamilton McCarthy, Esq., 377 O'Connor street, Ottawa. 'Dear Sir:—Your tender to construct the Champlain monument here, dated 9th inst., has been handed to the committee by the Honorable Senator Ellis. 'In accordance therewith please find enclosed cheque on the Bank of N. B. A. here for \$1,500. 'Your tender is accepted, and this payment is made to you conditionally on the committee not being held in any way personally liable for payment of any monies except such as may come into their hands. 'Kindly acknowledge receipt of the money on these conditions. 'I am yours very truly, D. R. Jack, 'Secretary to Committee.'

SITE CHOSEN FOR BIG QUEBEC CAMP

Will be Within Two Miles of City—Plans for Immense Grand Stand

Quebec, April 15.—The location of the military camp has been chosen. There will be room to camp 20,000 or 24,000 troops and some will be more than two and a half miles from the city, all within easy electric and steam railway connection. The camp grounds will be on the St. Charles road, the Charlebourg road and the Cemetery road. The artillery will be posted, it is proposed, right in the city, between the citadel and the Plains of Abraham. Plans are being prepared for the erection of a grand stand on the Plains of Abraham for the greatest production. This stand will be built to seat 15,000 and 20,000.

OBITUARY

Mrs. Ella G. Lutwick Moncton, April 15.—(Special)—The death of Mrs. Ella G. Lutwick, widow of the late D. D. Lutwick, occurred at her home in Bridgedale, Albert county, yesterday after a week's illness. She was born in St. John, N. B., but lived the greater part of her life in Alma, Albert county. She was 62 years of age and survived by two children, Graham K., of Moncton, and Marie at home. The interment will take place at Medouctie, York county, on Friday.

Rev. Isaac McAnn

Moncton, April 15.—(Special)—The death of Rev. Isaac McAnn occurred last night at the residence of L. W. McAnn in the illness of a week. The deceased was a member of the Methodist church, and was the father of the late Rev. McAnn, who was an uncle of W. McAnn, being his father's only brother, had been a resident of Moncton, living with his wife for the last two or three years. He was 86 years of age and had been a superintendent of Vermont Methodist Episcopal church for the last fifteen years. Previous to coming to Moncton he had been a resident of Cliftonville, Mass., and had been a member of the Methodist Episcopal conference in 1853, laboring in Virginia during all his active life except for two or three years spent with the Troy, New York, conference. For some time he was dean of theology at the Boylston Institute, Boylston, Va. Mr. McAnn left no family, his wife having predeceased him on the 4th of February last.
