"King Ferdinand had hardly begun to read his speech, when he was interrupted with cries of Down with the government,' from M. Mille, leader of the interventionists, and his adherents.

"The supporters of the government replied with cheers for the king. The latter's speech was punctuated throughout by shouts from the opposition.
