





WHAT ACT REQUIRES. Under the Act every person in th

Under the Act every person in the city, whose total income was not cov-ered in a return from his or her em-ployer, had to file with the board a sworn statement of the amount of in-come received during 1925, and the amount of personal property, exclusive of household furniture, owned by him on her. If this is not done, the assessors may make an assessment and as a penalty for not filing the statement may double the valuation for the year in which no return is filed. Under legislation passed two years ago men with families have certain exemptions, but these do not apply unless a return is filed, and no appeal will be considered unless a return has been filed, Mr. Olive said.
