

IMPERIAL HAS ONE OF BEST IN RECENT FILMS

"His People" Gripping Tale of Life in New York Ghetto

Imperial Theatre patrons who took advantage of the spring-like weather yesterday afternoon and last night for picnicking, enjoyed something quite unusual in photoplays in seeing "His People," an intensely emotional story of life among just plain family folks in a tenement district, the chief characters being Jewish and Irish.

Imperial's program included an splendid budget of Pathé News which, beginning this week, will be six weeks earlier than usual; one of those ludicrous Asop's Fable cartoons, an artistic orchestral overture and the usual fine music by the orchestra and Wuritzer organ.
