

FRUZETTI GIVEN RAW DECISION IN FIGHT WITH McKENNA

BROCKTON MAN FOULED, SAYS SYDNEY PAPER

Fruzzetti, Here on Way Home, Claims He Was Hit Low Five Times

JIMMY FRUZETTI, of Brockton, who has gained much popularity with the local fight fans through his gentlemanly and sportsmanlike conduct in and out of the ring, arrived in Saint John yesterday afternoon from Sydney, where he fought Jack McKenna on Tuesday night. Speaking of the fight, which was awarded to McKenna on a knockout in the seventh round, Fruzzetti said that McKenna fouled him at least five times during the course of the fight and he became disgusted and refused to continue. Fruzzetti went to Sydney with the intention of meeting a welterweight, but McKenna refused to weigh in and scaled at least 185 pounds, while Fruzzetti weighed but 165 pounds.

Fruzzetti's contention that he was fouled is borne out by the account of the fight in the Sydney Record. The report says that McKenna lost much of his popularity with the Sydney fans owing to the tactics he used. He wrestled Fruzzetti all over the ring, hit him low on several occasions and even bent him over the ropes. According to the Sydney writer, McKenna should have been disqualified for the way he fought. He was warned twice by the referee, but it had no effect.

MARKS SHOW FOULS.

When Fruzzetti came out of his corner in the seventh round he was met by a blow that landed foul. He was pushed over the ropes and landed outside and was counted out. The Sydney paper says that in any other ring Fruzzetti would have won on a foul. An examination in the dressing room revealed the fact that Fruzzetti had been fouled at least twice. He had two red blisters as well as a skin bruise to show where blows had landed. In the second round his arm was wrenched badly, and the next day he was going about the streets with it in a sling.

Continuing the paper says the bout was fairly even until the unsportsmanlike ending. Fruzzetti didn't lose a fight by his performance, and the majority of fans thought he did the right thing by staying down in the seventh round. He will be warmly welcomed here again any time he comes to Cape Breton against a man of his own weight, and fans will flock to see him, as he is a game, rugged, willing, clever boxer who apparently has no other purpose in mind but to give the fans a run for their money.

Fruzzetti will leave for his home on Saturday evening.

SCOUTS for the Cleveland club are looking for a new first baseman for the Indian outfit.

But this reason for stating the condition is that while the Cleveland scout hunters seek such a man, George Burns, who has been slated to step down in favor of some bright young man ever since the spring of 1919, goes on his way. Not on the even tator of it, however, for he is playing as this writing the most brilliant game he has ever displayed.

Here is a man at the old baseball age of 31 or more, with 13 years of baseball behind him, hitting over .350 and leading the league in scoring out doubles. He and little Joey Sewell form one of the most dangerous "punching outfits" in the big show today.

And at first few fans can see this evidence that he is slowing up. In fact, he seems to have taken a new lease on life.

The odd part about Burns is that the early years of his career found him struggling in vain to make anyone believe that he was any better than a fair first baseman.

The Tigers gave him his first tryout in 1912 and 1914. Four years later he was traded to the Athletics. Despite the fact that he proceeded to hit .352 for the Mack team that year they were unwilling to give him the nod next season, when baseball was cut short by the work or fight order. Come did not figure him valuable enough to carry through the war period. The Cleveland club assumed his contract—just in time to permit him to play a big part in the winning of Cleveland's first pennant and world's championship.
