

## ARE TAKING LAW EXAMS AT CAPITAL

Admission as Attorneys in November Will Include Saint John Students.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 21.—The law examinations of the Province of New Brunswick which are being written in the large committee room of the parliament building are being taken by the largest number of students on record. Fourteen in all are writing, seven candidates including one young woman, are writing the finals; three candidates are taking the first intermediate examinations and four candidates are writing the second intermediate examinations.

The candidates for first intermediate are: George Y. Jones of Woodstock, P. G. Lawson of Edmundston, and Charles G. R. Comben of Woodstock. The candidates for second intermediate are: D. W. Wallace of Fredericton, H. F. G. Bridges of Campbellton, H. C. Bishop of Bathurst and F. H. Barry of Chatham.

Those writing the finals are as follows: H. F. Reddy, Moncton; E. E. Fitch, Moncton; Joseph W. Seng, Fredericton; A. Hallam L. Slipp, Fredericton; Paul E. H. Barry, Fredericton; Margaret Sinn, Fredericton; J. T. Troy, Chatham.

The admission of the candidates as attorneys will take place at the November term of the Supreme Court. Graduates of University of New Brunswick Law School who are admitted without examination will also appear.

## Suggests Aid To Prospectors To Uncover N. B. Mineral Wealth

The importance of having the information supplied by the geologists of the Dominion Department of Mines in regard to the mineral possibilities of New Brunswick, supplemented by practical prospecting to find the hidden wealth was strongly stressed yesterday by Dr. Albert O. Hayes, Ottawa, before the industrial committee of the Board of Trade.

Dr. Hayes, who is one of the department of mines staff, has been in this province all summer, making geological surveys, and is of opinion that much potential wealth is locked up in the soil and waiting for the miner to make it available.

He suggested that the Provincial Government aid bone-fide prospectors to carry on and that they aid the University of New Brunswick to give a good course in mining as a part of the curriculum.

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## PROJECT OF SUMMER HOTEL REPORTED

From Vanceboro District Comes Rumor of Plan to Build at Spedic Lakes.

A report that emanates from the Vanceboro district and which cannot be traced to an authoritative source, is to the effect that a summer hotel may be erected on the Spedic Lakes on the boundary waters of Maine and New Brunswick, headquarters of the St. Croix river.

The story may have been started, it was said, through the efforts of some well known New Brunswick guides to secure camping rights and fishing preserves on the big chain of bass and trout lakes. The statement is made that "American" transportation interests have interested capitalists in the spot as a week-end recreational resort, and that investigations are in progress.

**THERE LAST SUMMER**  
It will be recalled that last June a party of railway and coastal steamship chiefs were the guests of Judge Bruce of Massachusetts and Guide W. Harry Allen on these lakes. The party included C. P. B. New York, New Haven and Hartford; Boston and Maine, Maine Central and Metropolitan S. S. line executives, and during the outing-contrast of the New Brunswick officials, emphatically stated that if New Brunswick people would supply the sporting and vacation facilities, they would strive to divert the travel to them. In fact the big eastern centres were looking for new places.

Whether or not the reported investigation of the St. Croix lakes—a unique in the world—is an initial step in supplying these facilities on a large scale, or merely some private property overtures, is not yet known. In any case, the people of the district are hopeful of the development of their fishing waters as a popular resort.

S., and Premier Ritchie, of Nova Scotia, also are on the program. Hon. Dr. Baxter will return to the city on Friday. On next Monday he is to speak at Amherst and Chatham. Tonight, he will be the chief speaker at a rally in St. Martins.
