## GERMANS BEGIN FIGHT TO HOLD SAAR DISTRICT

Active Paid Propaganda is  
Already Under Way  
for Plebiscite.

Paris, Aug. 28.—Active propaganda, aid for and carried on by Prussian individuals and organizations, is already being conducted in the Saar in preparation for the plebiscite in 1935. The Treaty of Versailles provided for the plebiscite, and envisaged three possible results—return of the territory to Germany, or attachment to France, or the creation of a small autonomous state.

Typical of the Prussian efforts to sabotage the plebiscite in advance is the following appeal to the population of the Saar, published in "L'Echo National."

"The future of the Saar is in great danger. With all our strength we must defend the rights guaranteed to us as to our Germanism and our liberties. Our road is difficult and it will bring us to the desired destination along the entire population co-operates."

The creation of the Landesrat, the commencement of preparations for the plebiscite of 1935, the discussion of the Saar question in parliament of various countries, the intelligent intervention of Sweden in favor of our rights, the proposal of the British Government for an investigation by the Council of the League of Nations into the present administration of the Saar—all this is the result of our common efforts.

"The Saar population must tenaciously continue in its efforts, even engaging its demands and its activities. We do this considerable sums of money necessary. Without money our demands are tied. We therefore appeal to you to contribute generously. Every cent should give as much as possible. Common fund has been founded by

the parties represented in the Landesrat—the Center, German Socialist, Liberal-Popular, German Democratic parties. Payments should be made in favor of the 'Saarland-Zukunft' ('Future of the Saar') in the following banks."

The banks named are all Prussian institutions.

"L'Echo National" declares this sort of thing to be in violation of the spirit of the Versailles Treaty and urges the Government to put a quick end to "this manoeuvre of a few Prussian agitators who pretend falsely to represent the opinion of the Saar population."

## EXTINCTION FACES THE LABOR HERALD

(Canadian Press Dispatch.)  
London, Aug. 27.—In connection with the recent announcement that the Daily Herald, official organ of the Labor party in Great Britain, may cease publication on Sept. 30, owing to lack of support, it is stated that during the last year the Trades Union Congress has spent \$76,000 on the Herald.

Commenting on the threatened extinction of the Daily Herald, the London Observer says Germany can support a great Labor newspaper like the movement in the world, a Labor paper should have some difficulty in striking roots. The idealism of the Labor movement apparently is unequal to the task of supporting a Labor paper as against the penny daily, the Observer says.

The collapse of the Daily Herald will be a blow to the Labor party, the Observer declares, and adds that the Herald might fight on as a political broadsheet.

ENGLISH CHURCH TO AID  
AUSTRALIAN EMIGRATION  
Melbourne, Aug. 28.—The Anglican Church of Great Britain has undertaken to share with various state governments of Australia the cost of bringing over desirable Englishmen to settle in Australia. In Western Australia the government and the church each contribute a third of the transportation charges, the remainder coming from private sources. Measures have been taken for the reception, placing and after-care of British settlers from the mother country.

In South Australia, the Anglican church will undertake to assist the arrivals after they set foot on Australian soil.

CASE OFF UNTIL SEPT. 13.  
The case of Franklin W. Allen of Long Island against the Atlantic Sugar Refineries, a suit for approximately \$2,000, was continued in the Circuit court before Mr. Justice Crockett yesterday afternoon. Mr. Allen said that he was the official reporter for the U. S. Federal Trade Commission. The commission held an investigation into the sugar industry. He said the refineries company accepted his offer to supply them with the evidence at 15 cents a page. The report amounted to some 15,000 pages. The company refused to accept the report, contending that they had only ordered a copy of the finding. Mr. Lowrey, statistical manager for the company, on the stand said that he had understood that he had ordered a summary of the case and not a complete report. The court adjourned until September 13. C. F. Inches, R. C. and E. C. Weyman appeared for Mr. Allen, and Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., for the defendant company.

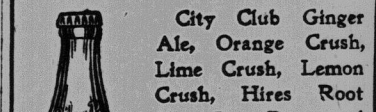
