## SWEDISH WORKERS SEEK VOICE IN COMPANIES

Dangers and Other Unpleasant Features Are Cited in General Warning

Stockholm, April 29.—(Associated Press, By Mail)—Organized labor and participation of workers in the direction and control of Swedish industrial enterprises employ twenty-five persons or more are recommended in a plan just submitted to the government by the official committee on Industrial Democracy. The recommendation involves more general recognition of labor unions, who for many years have been employed in advisory and executive advice from their employers.

According to the committee's scheme, so-called councils may be established in industrial plants of twenty-five or more employees, providing such a measure is approved by the authorized labor union concerned. In the larger concerns these councils shall consist of three to five delegates for the workers, sitting with not more than three representatives of the employer. It shall be the duty of the operation council to utilize the technical experience of the industrial workers for the good of the concern, and the employer must furnish the council with necessary information regarding the production. The council also may pass on questions of change in the equipment and methods of the plant.

## PREDICT A TIMBER FAMINE

London, May 29.—Forestry experts in many lands fear a world timber famine before many years pass, according to the British Forestry Commission, which says that the results of such a famine will be more disastrous to the United Kingdom than to any other country. The virgin forests are being used up far more rapidly than has been supposed.

Many other countries in Europe fear such a famine, and the commissioners urge that measures be taken at once to meet the situation. They are taking steps to ascertain what reserves of coniferous timber are available, and how long they are likely to last; but foresters say there can be little doubt that in the near future the British Government will have to choose between resuming the extensive planting programme adopted by Parliament at the close of the war and running the risks of deforestation.

The commission urges the people to take a broad view of forestry problems, pointing out that the reasons which make necessary the maintenance of the Forestry Commission are not merely local, but arise from world-wide conditions.

## WOULD SIGN A CONTRACT FOR AIRPLANE EXPRESS

American Railway Express Official Says the Company Only Awaits Assurance of Adequate Service.

Washington, May 29.—Robert R. M. Cowie, Vice President of the American Railway Express Company, has assured the National Aeronautic Association that his company stood ready to enter into a contract for an air express service between New York and Chicago as soon as a dependable airline service was available. He said he was certain that when an air express service between New York and Chicago was established the public would find a use for it.

Not only would his company enter into a contract with a properly organized air service company, he said, but it would exploit the faster service, advertise rates, pick up shipments at points of origin and deliver them at air terminals at main line airports.

"I firmly believe the day will come when some well-organized airline service will be in the field to conduct a regular commercial transportation business between New York and Chicago and other large cities," said Mr. Cowie. "Gradually that day is approaching under the impetus of the information work carried on by the National Aeronautic Association."

"I have been approached by many persons interested in air transport, and I have told them all that the need was for establishing the operation line, and then we would be immediately ready to make a contract."

"Our idea is that commercial aviation is the next evolution in transportation for light, non-bulky packages of an emergency character, where the saving in time rather than the charge is the controlling factor. ## BRITISH CRIMINALS TURN TO SWINDLING AS EASIEST LIVING

Crimes of Violence Grow Less as Crooks Get Big Gains and Small Punishments from Clever Fraud.

London, May 29.—(By Mail)—The new type of criminal, as depicted by Sir Leonard Dunning, Inspector of constabulary, in his annual report, is really a greater danger to society than the old type criminals "The London Daily Mail" writes.

"Crimes of violence have steadily decreased for years," says Sir Leonard. "Modern crime is civilized and educated, the police know well but are powerless to arrest," he said. "They are men and women who derive very large incomes by their wiles and the ordinary credulity of a certain section of wealthy people."

"These criminals are well educated, well dressed, well spoken and they stay in the best class of hotels, spending thousands of pounds on their travels, and they are not afraid to expose their own stupidity in the police courts."

"And when there is a prosecution, which is not rare, if found guilty—and that is always a remote possibility—are given ridiculous sentences. Only a short time ago a man who had swindled people all over the country of hundreds of thousands of pounds was sent to prison for nine months in the Second Division for an assured and handsome income which was being kept from him by the police."

"I think it would be a very good thing if the police were empowered to round up all these criminals and charge them under the vagrancy act unless they can prove to the magistrate that they are getting their living by strictly honest means."

"Violence is silly and usually profitable, and they are more easily brought home to the offender."


