

TRIAL OF RADICALS BEGUN IN CHICAGO

Expected to Take From Four to Six Weeks to Get a Jury—Right of Each Side to 300 Challenges.

Chicago, May 12.—Twenty-six radicals, who are said to have gathered here last September to form the communist labor party, were placed on trial in criminal court on Monday, charged with conspiracy to advocate the overthrow of the United States government and with criminal syndicalism.

What effect Secretary of Labor Wilson's ruling that membership in the communist labor party did not constitute grounds for deportation, will have on the trial is problematical. The state contends it will have none as the defendants are American citizens charged with conspiracy.

The outstanding figure of the group in court Monday was William Broderick Lloyd, millionaire sergeant-at-arms of the communist labor convention, and son of the late Henry D. Lloyd, said to have been a rich Boston philanthropist. He is a close friend of William D. (Big Bill) Haywood, former secretary-general of the I. W. O.

It is estimated the trial will last three months. Selection of a jury is expected to take from four to six weeks and to exhaust a veritable host of men on each side will have 300 challenges.

Among the state witnesses will be Ole Hanson, former mayor of Seattle.

LAMBETH MEETING AND THE PULPIT

London, May 12.—(By Canadian Press)—Are sermons indispensable? This is one of the questions on which a decision may be taken by the bishops of the Anglican Church at their meeting in Lambeth in July.

A section of churchmen are declared to be of the opinion that the day of the sermon has passed. They hold that if a man has not the gift of preaching, it would be better for everyone that he should not preach. The "two sermons each Sunday" custom, they say, imposes a great strain on the clergy—a strain equally if not more heavily felt by the laity who are required to listen to the effusions. The unpopularity of published volumes of sermons, often in great demand, is cited by this faction as evidence of waning effectiveness of the sermon.

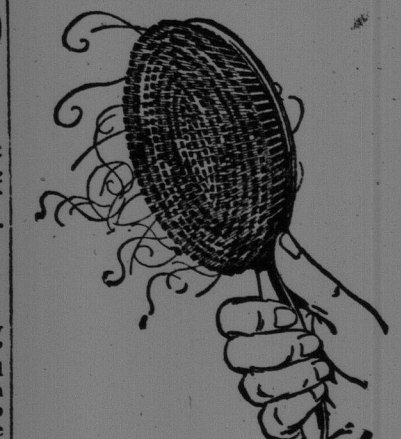

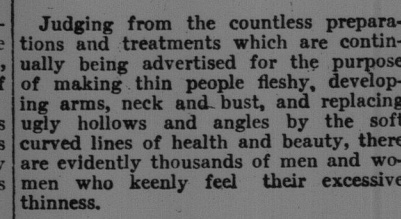

CONVENTION PRICE TO BE \$41 A PINT

Charge to Be Made for Liquor When Politicians Meet in Chicago.

Detroit, May 12.—Bootleggers, booze smugglers and other violators of federal prohibition laws, who have defied government agents in Detroit and Michigan will soon be populating prisons and contributing heavy fines to the United States Treasury.

This is the promise of Major A. V. Dalrymple, prohibition enforcement officer for the Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and Indiana districts, who declared that plans had been completed to put Detroit outlaws permanently out of business.

Because of its proximity to the Canadian border and opportunities for smuggling liquor across the river, Detroit requires special attention, Dalrymple admitted it was true that liquor would be sold in Chicago during the Republican National Convention next month, but the "bell boys" at leading hotels had got together and decided that \$41 a pint was the price the would ask.

\$1,500,000 FOR HOUSE BUILDING

Windsor Council Adopts the Housing Act of 1920.

Windsor, May 12.—At a recent meeting the city council adopted the 1920 housing act of the provincial government, thereby releasing \$1,500,000 for the construction of workmen's houses in Windsor. It is expected the money will permit of the immediate construction of at least 300 houses. The houses may be built under two plans, one permitting lot owners to borrow as high as \$4,500 at 6 per cent, to be repaid in twenty years or an alternative by which the completed house may be sold to the workingman for not more than \$4,000 at 5 per cent. A resolution to pay the members of the housing commission a salary of \$25 a month was defeated.

THE CREDIT SYSTEM

Bankers say that there has been measurable improvement in the general credit situation even yet. The bank statements of last Saturday were good, but not startlingly so, and call money today ranged within the limits of 7 and 8 per cent. Also, there was a little money to be had at about 8 1/2 per cent, for sixty days. But in the latter department of the money market the offerings were small and did not nearly suffice to meet the demand. As for the bill market, that was absolutely flat. Dealers quoted the market nominally at 6 1/4 per cent to 6 per cent, and it
