CREDIT BEING GIVEN TO THE WRONG MAN

Not to Premier Fleming But Messrs. Fugley and Carvell Are Thanks of the People Due

(Canadian Sentinel.)

The efforts of the two papers to laud Premier Fleming for services in connection with the St. John Valley Railway are very amusing. Great is Premier Fleming, but he is simply adopting the very scheme that was carefully worked out by Dr. Pugsley and Mr. Carvell. He backed down on the original terms of the deal, and built an electric railway, and during the period he was working this scheme, he had nothing to say about commencing with the Grand Trunk Pacific and handling the freight of the road destined for St. John. Mr. Fleming may possess all the virtues, high principles and lofty ideals which we hear about at banquets and receptions given in his honor, but he is a colossal nerve to credit him with giving the people of the St. John Valley a steam railway with trunk line connections.

It will be remembered that a public meeting was held in Antigonish to protest against Premier Fleming's course in regard to the railway matter, which was attended by prominent Conservatives, including Senator Baird. Concerning this meeting the following report was published:

"Several of the speeches were strongly condemnatory of the scheme put forward by Hon. Mr. Fleming for a road through Maine, and a resolution introduced by T. J. Carter, asking the dominion government to reduce the grade of the Valley Railway to that of the I. C. R. A strong delegation was appointed to urge the provincial government to accept the standing offer of the federal government."

After this Mr. Fleming backed down and now he is receiving fulsome praise for his great service in forwarding a scheme he so utterly fought. The Fredericton Mail says:

"It is due to the efforts of Messrs. Fugley and Carvell that an act was passed by the dominion parliament a year ago providing for the leasing and operation of the road as part of the I. C. R. system. It is this act that furnishes the safeguard to the people of New Brunswick today and guarantees the province against future financial loss in connection with the Valley Railway project. What was the attitude of the local government in connection with the I. C. R. operation? They tried their level best to dodge the issue and had it not been for the firm stand taken by Hon. Dr. Pugsley they would have succeeded in foisting an electric railway scheme upon the province."

TARIFF ISSUE WITH STATES BUT POSTPONED

September 21 Did Not Settle It, Says Hon. Mr. Lemieux

SPEECH IN MONTREAL

End of Tariff War Predicted and Wars of Amament Will Also Go, Says Professor Gordon to the Reform Club

That the war of amament and tariff walls were like bound to disappear, and that the question of freer trade with our neighbors to the south had not been settled by the decision of September 21st, were among the declarations advanced to a gathering of the Montreal Reform Club Saturday evening.

Professor A. R. Gordon, of McGill, predicted the end of wars, both tariff and by sea and land, in a vivid address on "Open and British Free Trade." For a time, he said, the nations might pile up their tariff walls as they do their armaments, but the very pressure of the burdens would lead to freedom. The Liberals of Canada had struck out on this path. They were the leaders who had shown them the way, and he hoped they would still more for his broader vision of humanity. "We are with him," Professor Gordon said, "that Canada will reach her true development only when she realizes her destiny among nations of the world. We offer him our love and loyalty; and we pledge ourselves to do what we can to restore him to power, that he may lead us ever forward on the true lines of national prosperity, honor and righteousness."

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux declared that the question of freer trade with our neighbors had not been disposed of on September 21, as some people seemed to think. The issue of trade on that occasion had been obscured by many other issues and the evidence of this fact was recently given in the House of Commons when members rose in the house and said they had been elected to obtain a new marriage law for Canada.
