**SAVINGS BANK**

**WOODSIDE REFINERY**  
The Acadia Sugar Refinery Co., Ltd., of Halifax, N. S., have received plans for their new refinery to replace their Woodside plant which was recently destroyed by fire, and the contracts for building and machinery are being placed. The capacity has been largely increased, and the new machinery will be of the most modern type. Two new buildings, it is announced, will be as nearly fire proof as possible.

**SISTER IN ST. JOHN**  
Halifax Chronicle—The death of B. J. Hubley occurred at his residence 3 North Park street, at half-past eleven o'clock last night. He was ninety-three years of age. He was engaged in the feed business in Bedford Row for many years. His wife died about a year ago. He leaves two sons, E. Hubley, of this city, and P. A. of Montreal. Mrs. W. H. Innes, and Mrs. W. Teas, of this city, are daughters, and Mrs. Sophia Grano, of St. John, a sister.

**FOREIGN COAL MARKETS**  
The Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co. has captured a contract for the export of more than 30,000 tons of coal to Uruguay, while the Dominion Coal Co. is shipping to many foreign ports such as Montevideo, Cape Verde, Rio de Janeiro, the West Indies and several European ports have drawn on Nova Scotia for coal supplies recently, mainly no doubt, owing to the scarcity arising out of the recent coal strike.

**THE STEAMERS**  
The S. S. Bengore Head is expected to arrive in port this afternoon. She will load here for Dublin. This will be the last sailing of the Head Line to this port this season.

The Donaldson liner Cassandra, which arrived yesterday, was shifted over to the McLeod wharf this morning.

**THE NEW WHARVES**  
Thomas P. Charlson, of Ottawa, who is associated with Michael Connolly in the construction of the new government wharves at Sand Point, arrived in the city at noon today to superintend the commencement of work on the crabs. Mr. Charlson said this morning that he understood that the timber has already arrived in the city from up river, and they will be able to start at once. This is a fortnight earlier than they had anticipated and when they do commence they will exert every effort to rush the work along. Considerable stone for the foundation has already been put in place.

McDonald, who left last night for Memramcook, where he is one of the principals in a very happy ceremony. Mr. McDonald received a very fine china tea set.

## BODIES OF ASTOR AND OTHERS TO BE TAKEN THROUGH HERE TODAY

Five of Titanic Dead Transported Through St. John to States This Morning

Five bodies of the Titanic disaster were taken through the city this morning on the early Halifax express and taken to the states on the Boston train. The private car "Constitution" had one body, while three of the other bodies were those of F. D. Millet, of Washington, M. C. Long, of Worcester, Mass., and E. O. Oshby, of New York. The body of Colonel Astor is to be taken through this evening in the private car "Osmo," as well as the body of J. Straus, which will be in car No. 700 of the T. C. R. The bodies will be taken from here to the Boston express which leaves here at 6:40 o'clock.

## RED FLAG OF SOCIALISM IN MONTREAL STREETS

A Parade to Champ De Mars For May Day Celebration

Montreal, May 1.—Borne by a girl clad in flaming scarlet, the red flag of socialism will be carried through the streets of Montreal tonight, heading a band of 1,000 of its followers who will parade to the Champ De Mars, the historic down town square, to hear the May day speeches. Sergeant ready to see that no insult is offered. This was decided last night at a meeting of the Young Socialists Club of Montreal.  
Early this afternoon women members of the socialist order were out in the streets, wearing red caps, the socialist button, and also socialist newspapers. It was decided that no further parade would be conducted for those. Whatever those willing to help the cause felt like contributing should be accepted.

## TODAY'S POLICE COURT

A Theft Charge—Sheffield Street Case is Defended

In the police court this morning, four prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined \$4 or two months in jail each. One woman, also charged with drunkenness, was sent for a term to the Good Shepherd's Home.  
William Allen, charged with assaulting Henry Carr in the latter's house in Duke street, pleaded not guilty to the charge. Carr testified that the prisoner, in company with several other young men, went to his house last night and tried to get into a party which was being held there. He, the witness, put Carr back and said that Allen tried several times to kick him, and that another one struck him in the face. Allen denied the charge and the case was adjourned until tomorrow morning to secure witnesses.  
Frederick Secord, arrested on a charge of assaulting his father, Abner Secord, pleaded not guilty. The father said that his son had been drinking and wanted to beat him. He tried to get him home but the son refused. He then had him arrested.  
Policeman Henry said that when he arrived on the scene, people were shouting "murder," "police," and that he arrested the prisoner because of what Mr. Secord had told him. He was remanded until tomorrow.

The case against Sarah Morris, charged with keeping a house of ill-repute in Sheffield street, and Gertrude Ebbett, Kathleen McLennan and Frederick Martin, charged with being inmates, was continued this morning. All went on the stand and denied the charges made against them. The Morris woman said that she kept a boarding house and that the prisoners boarded with her. The case was adjourned until two o'clock this afternoon.  
Frederick McDowell, charged with stealing \$7 worth of butter from Thomas E. Robinson, proprietor of a dairy in Main street, pleaded not guilty. He was arrested in St. Stephen several days ago.  
Mr. Robinson said that McDowell had been in his employ as a driver for two months, and that after his departure for St. Stephen he missed the butter. He suspected McDowell. The witness identified a hymn book which was found on the prisoner when arrested, as one that belonged to his wife.  
Carl A. Nelson, also in the employ of Mr. Robinson, told of missing a white coat on the day the prisoner went away. The case was adjourned until this afternoon.
