Ernestine Schumann-Heink, who never refuses a helping hand to young singers, says hundreds of young American girls with genuine talent are prevented from seeking a career in pera because the chances in this country are so limited and so few could bear he expense of a trip abroad and the ong wait to get a footing in some continental company.

The occasion of these remarks was he donation by Mme. Schumann-leink of \$1,000 to the Nordica Memirial Building which is to be part of an operatic centre at Stony Point-on-he-Hudson, where American artists will be encouraged.




