Catholic Edifice for Summer Residents and Vacationists in Vicinity

Construction of a new Catholic church between Westfield and Lingley stations on the Westfield road was begun this week. It will be ready for occupancy in about six weeks, according to replies to queries made this morning by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc.

His Lordship said that the church would serve Catholic people summering in the vicinity. It was not the intention to create at present a new parish in Westfield, His Lordship added, but the church was being built to accommodate people from the city and elsewhere who spend their vacation or reside in that locality during the summer months.

The church, according to plans drawn by J. Flood & Sons, the contractors, will be of wooden structure with fire proof roof.

It will be 48 by 28 feet, with vestry attached and will have a seating capacity of about 200. The foundation is to be of concrete. When completed it will be a modern country church.

It is understood that the interior finishing will not be completed this summer but the building will be brought to a stage of completion to allow for services before the Autumn.
