CANADA'S LATEST TARIFF ARRANGEMENTS; FIELDING DISCUSSES RECIPROCITY

Ottawa, Ont., June 10.—(Special)—The details of the trade agreements concluded with Belgium, the Netherlands and Italy were announced this morning. The Canadian intermediate tariff rates granted to France are extended to Belgium and the Netherlands in return for the friendly attitude which these countries have always maintained towards Canada and in view of the fact that they are now both low tariff countries and are entitled to equal treatment with France.
