Copenhagen, July 24.
The Danish government has intimated to Prussia its willingness to give guarantees for the protection of the German inhabitants of North Schleswig, but demands information as to the nature of the guarantees required by the Prussian Cabinet.

New York, 25th.
The S. S. Columbia, from Havana, July 24th, arrived yesterday. She brings late South American and Mexican news.
Yellow fever still prevailed in Havana but the number of deaths had decreased.
It was expected that the cable to this continent would be in operation in fifteen days.
Gen. Lopez, of Bolivar, has taken the field against the army of the Federal Government of Columbia.

The news from Mexico has the announcement of the shooting of Gen. Villanueva by order of Gen. Diaz.

Dublin, July 25.
While the police were conducting a search of Fenians through the principal streets of Tralee, the bystanders boldly cheered the prisoners, and increasing in numbers to a mob finally attacked the escort with stones. No determined attempt, however, was made to rescue the prisoners, and they were deposited in the town jail.

Paris, July 25th.
The Corps Legislatif yesterday passed all the provisions in the Budget for the Extraordinary Expenditures. By this action the only Sections of the Budget which had not previously been agreed to were disposed of and the other general business of the Session having been completed, the Corps Legislatif adjourned.

A political riot took place in East Tennessee Tuesday, in which two persons were shot dead seven mortally wounded, and about thirty slightly.

THE RELEASE OF THE BRITISH CONSUL AND OTHERS AT ALEXANDRIA—CAUSE OF THEIR DETENTION.—A few days ago we were informed by a cable despatch that the British government has ordered a detachment of troops to go to Abyssinia and compel the release of the British subjects who have been imprisoned there for some time resisted the power of Great Britain, but the indications are that he will be compelled to come to terms at last. With regard to the origin of the difficulty, in the year 1864 King Theodore took a notion that Queen Victoria of England would make him a suitable wife and Queen, and he proposed to a British Consul in his dominions that he should send to England a formal proposition for the Queen's hand. The Consul refused to send his sovereign such a proposition, and was at once seized by the King and put in prison. From that time to the present the King has disregarded all threats for the Consul's release, and other Englishmen who have been sent there to endeavor to bring the King to terms have been seized and imprisoned with the Consul.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell, who is a Senator of the Dominion and member of the Privy Council, has tendered his resignation of his seat in the Local Government, but His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has not yet signified his acceptance of the same.

Hon. Mr. Wilmot, a Senator of the Dominion, Hon. Mr. Connell, Hon. Mr. Fisher and Hon. Mr. McMillan who contemplate offering for the Commons, continue to retain their seats.
