From the Halifax Journal, July 17--24

Our Boston papers are to the 11th instant.—Accounts from different parts of the Union speak very favourably as to the prospects of the grain crops.

His M. ship Cornwallis Vice Admiral Sir Charles Paget, Capt. Sir R. Grant, arrived yesterday in 56 days from Portsmouth, via Madeira.—Lady Paget and Family accompanied the Admiral. The usual salutes were dispensed with, we are informed, in consequence of the indisposition of one of the family. His Majesty's ship Melville, Admiral Sir Peter Halkett, Capt. Douglas, we understand, sails on Wednesday next for England.

Mr. Munn, a Constitutionalist, has been elected Representative for the lower town of Quebec.

We regret to see, by our last papers, that several acts of violence and outrage have been committed upon the persons and properties of individuals favourable to the constitutional cause by those of the opposing party.—Some arrests had taken place, and we trust the government

will by promptness and decision, effectually check such lawless acts at their commencement.

QUEBEC, JULY 10.

The Montreal papers are filled with the proceedings of the late great meeting there.

Three persons had been arrested for disturbances at St Fustache. Other inhabitants had come into Montreal to complain of violence to the loyal inhabitants. Little else could be expected from the excitements in the newspapers, and the speeches and resolutions of the late meetings. A proclamation issued by the Governor on Friday, offers a reward of £100 for the discovery of the person or persons who fired into the house of Eustache Cheval and Joseph Cheval, on the 30th inst. at St. Eustache. We understand the Attorney-General proceeds to night to Montreal.

The Quebec Gazette, by authority, of this day, contains a Militia Order, by which His Majesty dispenses with the future services of Lieut.-Colonel Raizens as Lieut.-Colonel Commandant of the 3rd Battalion of Militia, of the county, Lake of Two Mountains, in consequence of that person having disobeyed the Militia General Order of the 21st June, requiring His Excellency's Proclamation of the 15th of that month, to be read at the head of every Militia Battalion throughout the Province.

Perhaps the Destructives will now, from this beginning, believe that the Proclamation means something.

Yesterday morning arrived the Portuguese schooner Antonia with a cargo of 183 negroes, in charge of Lieut. Hunt, of H. M. S. Racer, by which vessel she was captured on the 7th instant, to the southward of the island of Cuba.

The Antonia was about 50 days out from Africa; and being a roomy vessel, and the number taken on board comparatively small, she affords a rare instance of a slaver, offering none of the horrible accompaniments of filth, destitution and disease by which they are too generally characterised. The condition of the negroes was so favourable, that they were immediately landed, and with the exception of twenty-four selected for enlistment in the 2d West India Regiment, sent down to Roslyn. A large proportion of them are boys, and it is calculated that the whole will be placed out in the course of a week.—*Bahama Argus.*

BERMUDA, JULY 11.

We have been favoured with the following Extract of a letter received by a gentleman in this town dated

TRINIDAD, June 22, 1837.

"The enclosed newspaper gives but an imperfect account of the event which it details. It was very serious. I was out at St. Joseph's on Sunday, and saw the wretches that had been shot, as well as the wounded. The conspiracy seems to have been in progress about six months.—The powder which they plundered from the Magazine was bad, fortunately wet, or there would have been great slaughter among the Arema Militia; and luckily in their hurry they missed a barrel of ball cartridge which lay in a corner. However, they loaded with stones, buttons, bits of lead, &c., and even cut their ramrods in small pieces for the purpose. It may have one good result—at of deterring the Government from leaving these Islands, as they intended to leave them, exclusively in the possession of black troops."

It has often been said in this Journal, that the Province of Nova Scotia possesses resources within itself and around its coasts, of inexhaustible value and that if these were spiritedly and properly brought into action, the Province would be one of the most valuable appertaining to the British crown. We have no reason even now to doubt this; on the contrary, we are more than ever convinced of the truth thereof. A large and valuable source of profit has lately been discovered at Shelbourne, where Granite of the greatest value has been discovered.—Already have the quarries been opened by an enterprising Scotman, of the name of Fisher; one cargo of which has reached New York, and been sold at a good price. Several other cargoes are expected, and we have the best reason to believe that this new source of wealth will speedily become of national importance. Some columns, we understand have been wrought for a building in Halifax; and agents are on their way to St. John and other places, to procure further orders for the same. The admirable quality of the stone—its abundance, and its proximity to sea navigation, are of incalculable value; and will allow the article to be brought into market at a rate exceedingly low.—*N. Y. Albion.*

The Isle of White produces in one

year sufficient grain to maintain the inhabitants and visitors for seven.

A new episcopal church is about to be erected in this town. A pious and benevolent lady, connected with the Establishment, lately deceased, has, by her will, left £100,000 as a national legacy, for the express purpose of building churches; and Northampton it appears, is one of the favored towns destined to share her munificence.—*Northampton paper.*

On Tuesday last two large Russian ships, of nearly a thousand tons each, entered the port of Baltimore from Bremen, bringing about 40,000 bushels of wheat and 12 or 15,000 bushels of rye, besides 749 emigrants.—*Boston paper, July 17.*

A clinker built boat, apparently English, with three men on board, with several trunks on board, and plenty of sovereigns, left Barnegat, L. I. a few days since. They reported that they were from Savannah, and wanted to buy a sloop. It was suspected that they had robbed some English vessel, and had murdered the crew.—*Ibid.*

MILITARY DISPLAY.—No less than 50,000 men are to be assembled in the autumn reviews in Prussia. The Emperors of Austria and Prussia are expected to be present.
