WELLINGTON MINE FIRE

Spontaneous Combustion in the Slack Causes the Trouble.

Nanaimo Free Press: The news was received in this city this morning that the No. 4 (Bluff) shaft of the Wellington colliery was on fire, but from frequent enquiries at Wellington the Free Press learned that the fire was at the foot of No. 4 slope in the old No. 3 shaft workings.

It appears that Dunsmuir & Sons were arranging to take out some of the pillars in the old workings about a few days ago it was discovered that the slack in that portion of the mine was heating considerably. Efforts were at once made to check the spontaneous combustion, but this morning the fire broke out and got beyond control.

It is highly probable that both the No. 3 and 4 shafts will have to be flooded before the fire can be subdued. Owing to the low water in the millstream it would take at least three or four weeks to get enough water in the workings to reach the fire.

Mr. John Bryden, M. P., the general manager of the Wellington colliery, arrived by the train this morning from Victoria, and is now on the scene directing operations.

There is a cry of alarm in the city, as there is every appearance of a fire of employment for three or four months at least. From the position of the fire it is thought considerable difficulty will be experienced in extinguishing it.

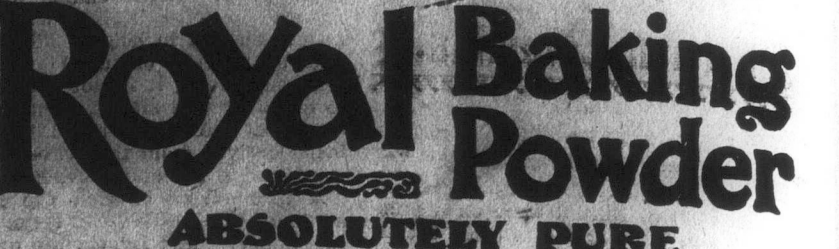
