
ENGINES WITHOUT BOILERS PROMISED.

GREAT FLOODS IN ENGLAND. LONDON, Oct. 13-The rain and flood situation in England shows the outlook becoming hourly more serious. There has been abatement of the downpour in London, but the total rainfall is rapidly approaching a point equal to the highest since the meteorological office was es-tablished in 1866. Rivers are high everywhere and in many places have broken their bounds. Railway traffic has been interfered with and great in-convenience has been caused in Several towns by inundation. Acres of grain are under water in Torkshire, and re-ports of general floods come from the north of England.
