HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 15.—Carl Parker, 15 years of age, son of Norman Parker, of East Weymouth, Hills County, accidentally shot himself yesterday afternoon. His parents were away for the afternoon and left the little fellow home to do chores. When they returned in the evening the work was not done and he was missing.

Search was instituted and his body was found close to the schoolhouse, lying near the fence over which it is presumed he had just climbed and in doing so discharged his gun. He was still breathing when found but was unconscious. Two doctors worked over the boy all last night but he never regained consciousness and died this morning.

CHILD IN RUINS OVER 2 WEEKS

REGGIO, Jan. 15.—A child of five years was taken from the ruins of a building here yesterday, entirely uninjured, having lain beneath the debris for eighteen days. An officer in passing heard the low moaning of the child and immediately began a search, delving in the direction from which the cries came. As he worked a wall fell and he was seriously injured, but even this did not deter him in his courageous effort, and he continued his task until he had reached the imprisoned child. The work of excavation and the exhumation of bodies continues. The population is calm.

In connection with the arbitration there are numerous pecuniary claims to be adjusted arising out of the seizure of fishing vessels for alleged infraction of fisheries laws of the respective countries concerned in the dispute. Some of these claims are of twenty or thirty years' standing and the decision in these cases will naturally follow in a large measure the award of the court with reference to the interpretation of the treaty. Mr. Aylesworth will arrange for a settlement of these claims in connection with the new treaty.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways, today disposed of rumors that have been published to the effect that the government contemplated either the sale or lease of the Intercolonial line to some private company. Asked as to his view as to various proposals made in the press, Mr. Graham said: "Of course, I have been deeply interested in the newspaper discussion and the various policies which have been outlined for the Intercolonial railway system. These articles have contained considerable information which, I may add, has not gone unnoticed. I do not regret this widespread discussion, because it tends to a better understanding of a problem which is not as generally understood as desirable. It is a mistake to think that the idea of any changes in the working of the Intercolonial was inspired on account of the falling off in traffic this year."

"The truth is that the government line in this respect is like all other roads, its condition is certainly no worse. But company roads are constantly making changes for the better in their methods of management, and why not the government line? I might say if changes are decided on they will not include either the sale or the lease of the government line."

The whole question of making improvements in the present system of management of the road is still under consideration of the minister and no definite proposition has yet been discussed at any length in the cabinet council.

MONTREAL HAS A BIG CIVIC SCANDAL NOW

Aldermen are Accused of Trying to But the Minister Admits Changes are Contemplated on the I. C. R.

MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—Civic administration has lately been attracting considerable attention owing to the numerous charges that have been made, and today there was another sensational development when at a meeting of the incorporation committee, J. Jacob, a contractor for a city stable, stated that Ald. Levesque, a leading member of the committee, had obtained \$1,000 from him as the price of securing the contract. Jacobs further stated that he had objected to the amount and that then the alderman had reduced his demand to \$600.

Mr. Levesque's denial was at once given by Ald. Levesque, who, in the charge, but Meleir, Martin, M. P., the chairman of the committee, added to the sensation by declaring that Ald. Levesque had approached him and told him he could get \$600 from the contractor. Jacob said that he would divide it with him.

Ald. Levesque emphatically denied both charges and expressed his intention of entering action at once against Ald. Martin and Contractor Jacob.

JURY ACQUITS HAINS AFTER TWENTY HOURS' DELIBERATION

FLUSHING, N. Y., Jan. 15.—After twelve hours of deliberation for twenty-two hours and taking fifteen orders before all agreed, the jury in the trial of the author and magazine writer, Thornton Jenkins Hains, at 3 o'clock this afternoon, found the prisoner not guilty as a principal with his brother, Capt. P. Hains, in the killing of Wm. E. Annis. For the second time in his life, Hains has been acquitted of the charge of murder, having been cleared of the charge of shooting a companion named Edward A. Hamilton, in an open boat in Hampton Roads, seventeen years ago.
