FOUR DROWNED
ATTEMPTING A
BRAVE RESCUE

Fourth Officer, Quartermaster and Seaman from S. S. President Gave Up Lives in Vain.

Marshallfield, Ore., Nov. 27.—Fourth Officer Shane, Quartermaster Oswald and Seaman H. Hansen, of the steamship President, from Seattle for San Francisco, were drowned fifty miles off Coos Bay last night when they attempted to rescue an unidentified steamer passenger who had been swept overboard by a heavy sea. The men put out in a ship's boat to effect the rescue and the boat was capsized. The President at that time was battling with a 70-mile gale and high seas were breaking over her bow.

After futile efforts to recover the bodies the President proceeded southward.

LARGEST OIL STEAMER

Jarrow, England, Nov. 27.—The largest oil carrying vessel in the world, having a capacity of 15,000 tons of oil, was launched here today. The vessel was christened San Hilario by Mrs. Herbert J. Carr of New York City. The new ship is one of ten tank steamers of the same size now being constructed for the Eagle Oil Transport Company.

Pearson's Sons, is endeavoring to obtain an "oil monopoly" in the Republic of Colombia, has been received with open scepticism by Colombians in Paris, among them Senior Jose Vicente Concha, nominee for the Colombian Presidency, who happens to be fully informed regarding what they call the "Pearson scandal."

"Lord Cowdray may not choose to label the contract he wishes to have ratified a 'monopoly,' but the situation that it would create if accepted by the Colombian Congress would amount to nothing less than monopoly."

Mrs. C. E. Wood is ill and has the sincere sympathy of many friends.

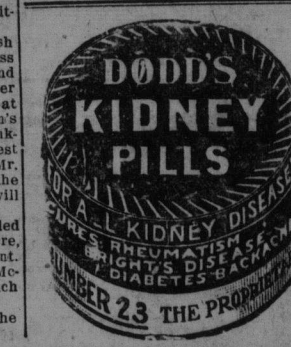
UNDERGROUND FIRE

TORONTO WOMAN
SERIOUSLY BURNED

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 27.—With her back and limbs seriously burned as the result of her bedclothing catching fire from the ashes of the pipe she was smoking while in bed this afternoon, Mrs. Mary McCorrigan, 65 years of age, was taken from her home at 73 Ryerson Avenue, to the Western Hospital, where she now lies in a serious condition. Mrs. McCorrigan had been an invalid for some time and when the fire occurred she was alone in her bedroom.

TANGO NOT ALLOWED
IN UPPER CANADA

Kingston, Ont., Nov. 27.—A ban was placed on the Tango at a big assembly held in the city hall by the Iroquois Club of this city, when it was announced for the benefit of all dancers that such dances as the tango would not be allowed.

The Alma Mater Society of Queen's University has also barred all such dances from their social functions and at the Royal Military College they are not allowed.

CHIEF MCGILLIOM
RECOVERS MONEY

Alleged to Have Been Stolen by George R. Leavitt at Oldtown, Maine—Spent Freely.

Fredericton, Nov. 27.—Special—Chief of Police McCollom this afternoon recovered most of the \$200 which George R. Leavitt, arrested here this morning, is accused of stealing at Oldtown, Me. Besides upwards of \$150 in money, largely American bills, the chief has a new watch purchased for \$16, a ring for which \$7.75 was paid, a 38-calibre revolver, a flashlight, a new suit case and travelling bag, as well as articles of clothing.

Leavitt started to spend his money freely as soon as he arrived yesterday, but got rid of only about \$50 before his arrest. When he was here two months ago he registered as from Bangor.

LAKE STEAMER ASHORE.

Alpena, Mich., Nov. 27.—The steamer I. W. Nicholas of Cleveland, bound from Port Arthur, Ont., to Buffalo with 175,000 bushels of flax went hard aground off North Point in Lake Huron last night. A tug has left to assist the stranded steamer, and it is thought she will be released by tonight. Part of the cargo is being thrown overboard in an effort to lighten her.

TWO AVIATORS MEET
TERRIBLE DEATHS

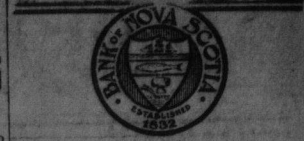
Epernay, France, Nov. 27.—The two aviators who were burned to death when their biplane caught fire yesterday near Chantemyle, were identified today as Captain Brie, of the Artillery, and Sapper Pouillard. The men were attached to the French army aviation centre at St. Cyr, and were flying from the aviation field to the army camp at Mailly.

As the pilot attempted a landing on the outskirts of the Chantemyle, the machine crashed into a hedge, the tank then exploded covering the aviators and its occupants with burning oil.

WILL HAVE TO APPEAL
TO GOVERNOR GENERAL

Montreal, Nov. 27.—William Campbell, the negro sentenced to death by Mr. Justice Cross, at the last session of the criminal court, and who was condemned to be hanged on next New Year's Eve for the murder of George Muir last August, will have to ask the Governor-General for clemency. His application for a new trial was rejected by the Court of Appeals today.

The decision of the court was rendered by Chief Justice Archambault, who said the trial judge was best qualified to decide whether the applicant was entitled to a new trial.
