HAMPTON CASES HEARD IN POLICE COURT AT SUSSEX

Information Against Two Hampton People for Illegally Selling Drugs was Withdrawn.

Hampton, May 12.—In the Kings County probate court, on the 10th inst., before J. Arthur Freeze, Esq., Judge of probate, the will of the late James Frederick Tabor, of Upland, was duly admitted to probate, and letters testamentary granted to Edmund A. Fiewelling, who is sole executor. The probate value of the estate is \$4,000, consisting of \$3,000 real estate, and \$1,000 personal property; all of which is left to his wife, Sarah Tabor, during her lifetime and after her death to be equally divided among the children.

Quite a number of Hampton people visited Sussex on the 10th inst., to be in attendance at the police court there, where two Hampton cases were down for hearing before Police Magistrate Hiram W. Folkins. The cases were: "The King vs. Ida J. Donald," and "The King vs. B. Lee Stevens," and "The King vs. a drug store illegally at Hampton, and the other for selling drugs illegally at Hampton. The information in both cases were laid by Frank B. Compton of Hampton, M. H. Parlee appeared for the defence, in both cases, and took objection to the jurisdiction of the court, whereupon the informations were withdrawn, the informant to pay the costs.

STRIKING POSTER TO BOOM CANADIAN AVIATOR FUND

Opportunity Afforded for Canadian Young Men to Enroll in Briton's Aerial Squadrons.

We have received an attractive poster with the stirring heading "Fight or Pay" and at the foot the words "Help Win The War." In between these commendable inspirations we find that the purpose of the poster (made clear by a very striking picture of an aeroplane blowing up a Zeppelin) is that an appeal is being made by the Canadian Aviation Fund for aid in the establishment of a school or schools of aviation in Canada to send trained Canadians to the firing line at the earliest possible moment. And also if surplus funds permit, to promote the gift for the same purpose of battle-planes made in Canada.

It would strike us that this movement is practical and well worthy of every assistance, particularly as the atmosphere concerning aviation and training for it has been greatly cleared by the information on the poster; namely, that in place of the very uncertain and unsatisfactory condition which appeared to obtain last autumn the War Office has now definitely made up its mind that it needs men from Canada who can fly, and is willing to take up to ten per month to the end of the war. They give a grant of 475 per trained pilot showing in a practical way their need of men.

The Dominion government's entry into this class of fighting is also heralded in that now it likewise grants \$100.00 per Canadian pilot who is accepted by the war office. We earnestly commend to some patriotic citizen the organization of a local committee to collect a fund for the purpose of aiding the movement in a general way, or possibly to provide the necessary fee to send to the school, and then to the front, a Canadian lad to represent the district. This fund can either be handed in to a branch of any charitable organization from Canada who can fly, or to the Canadian Aviation Fund or can be sent to one of the treasurers, namely, Capt. D. A. Cameron, manager Canadian Bank of Commerce, Toronto, treasurer for Eastern Canada, and Lieut-Col. C. W. Rowley, Canadian Bank of Commerce, Winnipeg, treasurer for Western Canada.



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
