BOARD OF COMMERCE PREPARED TO WORK

This is the first admission that the cut worms are doing serious damage in any part of the province.

STUNT AVIATOR FALLS TO HIS DEATH

Washington, July 6.—Leaving here yesterday to participate in a celebration at Baltimore, Lieut Pat Logan, said by aviation officers here to have been one of the best stunt flyers in the United States, fell 22,000 feet at Dunderberg Field, where the local militia were holding maneuvers. He sustained a fractured skull which caused his death an hour later.

QUEEN MAY VISIT AT MONTREAL

Montreal, July 6.—It is highly probable that Montreal may have the honor of welcoming Her Majesty, the Queen of Roumania, while no definite date has been announced by the Roumanian Consul here, preparations are being made in the Roumanian colony in Montreal to tender to the Queen the reception her position among her people warrants.

ST GEORGE YOUNG MAN BELIEVED DROWNED

He Mysteriously Disappeared From Work Early Yesterday Morning and Has Not Since Been Seen. Special to The Standard. St. George, N. B., July 6.—The town of St. George is today cast in gloom over the mysterious disappearance of Edgar McGillivray, the eighteen year old son of J. E. McGillivray, who suddenly disappeared this morning from the pulp mill. The young man had been working all night in the mill and about five o'clock this morning he had his lunch and, leaving one of the other workmen to look after his duties, while he left the mill for a few minutes, he departed and since that time has not been seen.

U. S. POLITICS OF INTEREST TO EUROPE

Awaiting Eagerly the Result of San Francisco Convention as Indicating America's Attitude in World Affairs. London, July 6.—Attention of Europe is concentrated upon three matters, the Spa conference, the Democratic convention in San Francisco and the stringency of the money market. The suspension of negotiations between the British and Russian Governments and the departure of Mr. Krasin has surprised no one. Moreover, no very great importance is attached to it, especially as force of circumstances is expected to cause the conversation to be resumed both in the interests of Russia and of the western powers without great delay.

U. F. O. TO OPPOSE SIR THOS. WHITE

Their Intention to Have Candidates in Every Riding in Province. Toronto, July 6.—It is said to be the intention of the United Farmers of Ontario to have candidates in practically every rural riding in this province in the next Dominion general election. Sixteen are already in the field, and two conventions are scheduled for this month. The United Farmers of Durham County will meet at Orono on July 10 to nominate a candidate to oppose Hon. N. W. Rowell. It is said that the U. F. O. will put a man in the field in West Lanes to oppose Fred Pardee the Liberal member. Leeds, the seat of Sir Thomas White, is to be organized by the United Farmers, it is said with a view to putting up a candidate against Sir Thomas.

IMPORTANT DEAL IS LOOKED FOR

Montreal, July 6.—The Street is firmly of opinion that there is a strong possibility of some deal between the Quebec Railway and the Shawinigan interests who own the Quebec Public Services Corporation in the city of Quebec. Today in the local market at Quebec on a turnover of about 30,000 shares touched 34 and closed at 33 1/2, up 3 1/2 points.
