

LUMBERMEN AND COMPANY AGREE

Settlement of Matters in Connection With Grand Falls Project

REVISION OF PLANS WILL BE MADE

Lumbermen's Objections as to Dead Water and Facilities for Passage of Logs Met by Company, and Agreement Will Be Drawn Up.

It is understood that a basis of settlement has been arrived at between the Grand Falls Power Company, Limited, and the St. John river lumbermen in regard to the proposed work of the power company.

Under the terms of the settlement, the power company undertake the driving of logs through the dead water and also provide a special log chute in the dam in addition to the log tunnel which will also be extended to prevent any possibility of a jam.

In the preliminary negotiations a statement in writing was submitted by the engineer acting on behalf of the lumbermen to Mr. Rice, the hydraulic engineer retained by the power company.

After considering the matter, Mr. Rice made his report to the power company. Acting on the report, the company agreed to all the suggestions of the lumbermen and the works will be constructed to their satisfaction.

H. McLoughlin, general manager of the power company, arrived in St. John Tuesday morning for a meeting at which Frank B. Carvell, P. of Woodstock, acting for the lumbermen, was present.

Frank P. Day, the 1905 Rhodes scholar from Mount Allison, has made a name as a political speaker and debater in England. He took part in the general political campaign, speaking in the interest of the North End, died at his home, 111 Chesley street, yesterday morning, aged seventy-seven years. He was unmarried and lived with his two nephews, John and James Hillias, and his niece, Bridget. He had been ill only since Good Friday.

John Nicholson died yesterday morning at the residence of his brother-in-law, James Daley, 229 Sydney street, aged thirty-four years. Mr. Nicholson is survived by his father, brother and one sister.

Mrs. S. J. Lauckner died at 12.45 o'clock yesterday afternoon at her home, 177 Sydney street. Mrs. Lauckner was the wife of the well-known baker of that name. She had been ill about three months with nervous prostration. She leaves her husband but no children.

Mrs. Lauckner was born in Fredericton and was 73 years of age. She leaves two sisters, Mrs. David Reid and Miss Jennie Seymour, and two brothers, John and Robert Seymour, of Island Falls. She had taken deep interest in the M. S. of Centenary church and was also noted for her generosity to the poor.

Mrs. George Ellis. The news of the death of Mrs. George Ellis, daughter of A. E. Ellis, of Montreal, which occurred in India on Good Friday, was heard with much regret by the lady's friends here. Mrs. Ellis formerly resided in Halifax, where her father was manager of the Bank of British North America. Mr. Ellis left Halifax about 1897 and is now manager of the bank in Montreal. A brother of the deceased, Robert L. Ellis, was on the staff of the Bank of British North America here several years ago. His wife was Mrs. Robinson, of this city. Deceased had been married but a year.

Miss Mary A. Baird. Chipman, N. B., April 17—There died recently at Salmon Creek, aged forty-five, Miss Mary A. Baird, eldest daughter of the late Francis Baird, the once well-known lumberman of Queens and Kent counties. Miss Baird's illness, which extended over a period of about three months, began with an attack of typhoid fever, which so impaired her digestive system as to cause her death.

The deceased was well and widely known. She was a member of the Presbyterian church and for several years acted as organist. Both locally and in the wider fields of the provincial work she rendered valuable and cheerful service in the interests of Sabbath school and other Christian activities. She bore her final affliction with a patience and fortitude which gave assurance of a deep and abiding faith. Interment was made at the old Red Bank cemetery. The funeral, which was largely attended, was conducted by the Rev. D. McD. Clark, pastor of the Presbyterian church.

The deceased leaves at home her mother, a sister, Rebecca, and a brother, Samuel. H. P. and R. T. Baird, of Fredericton, are brothers, and Mrs. Murray Starkey, of Coody's, is a sister.

At the close of the ceremony a largely attended reception was held at the home of the bride's parents.

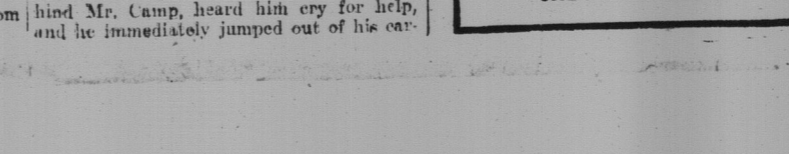
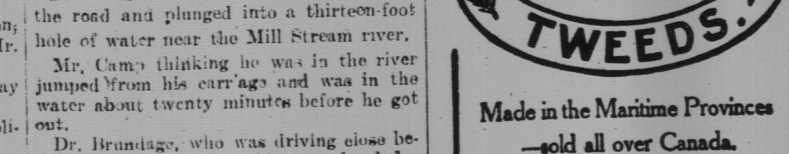
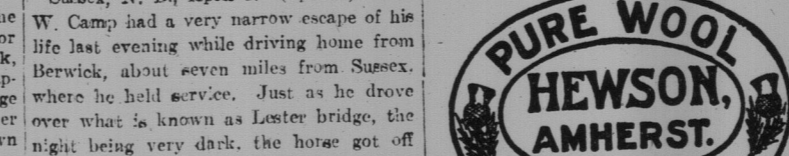
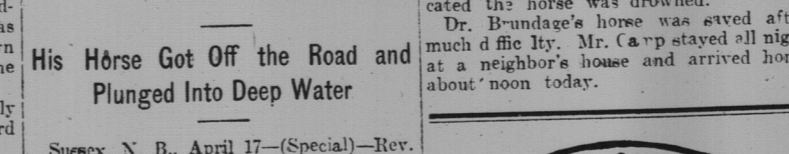
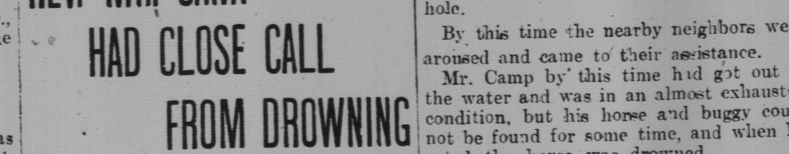
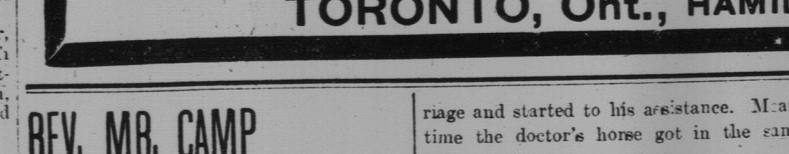
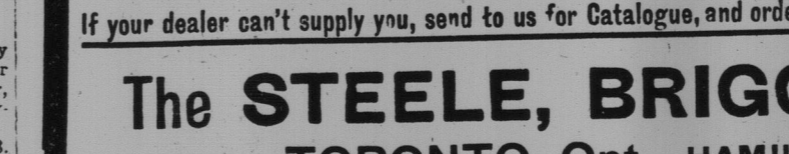
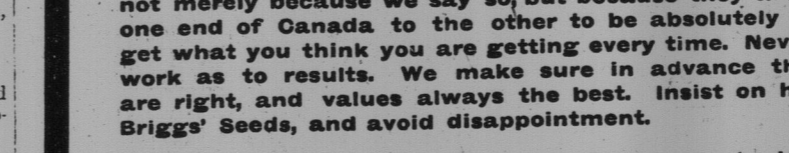
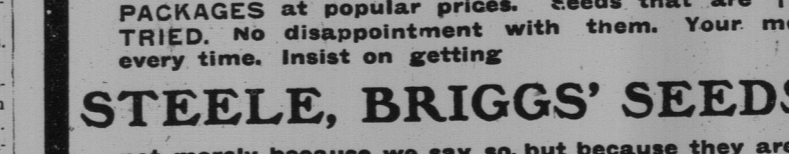
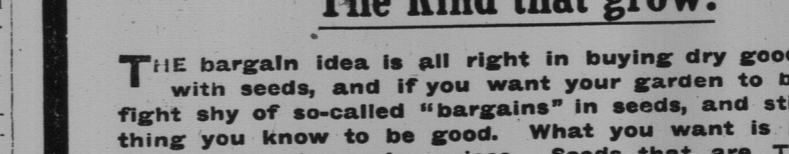
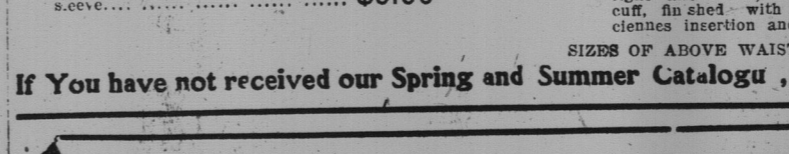
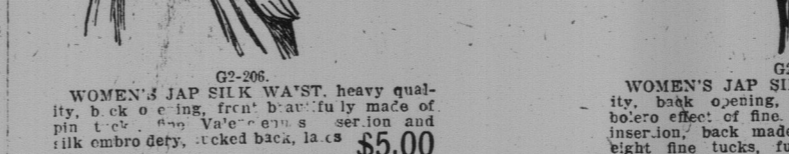
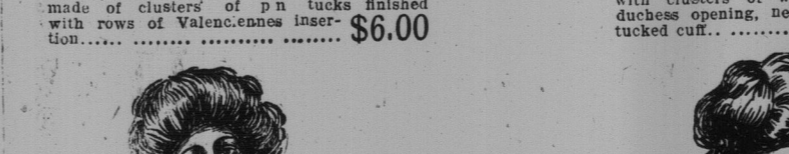
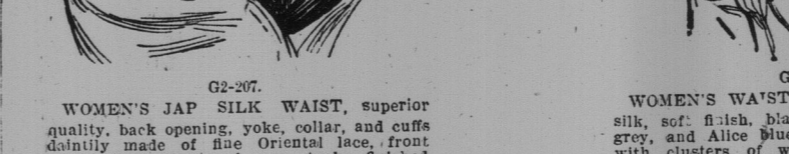
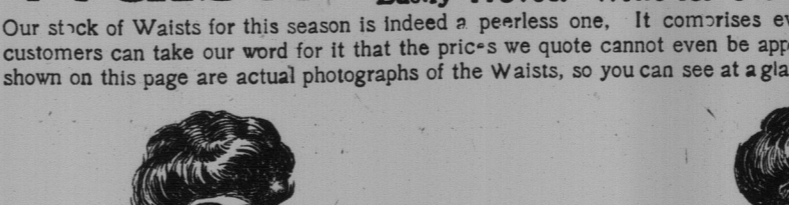
Mr. and Mrs. Spinnney left on the evening train for a visit to Montreal, Quebec, Toronto and Boston intending to return to Yarmouth by boat.

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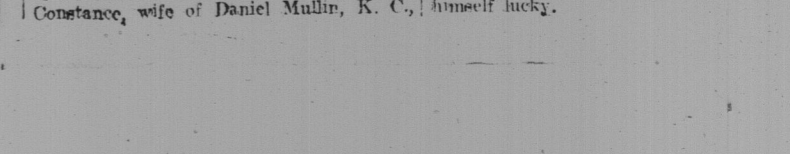
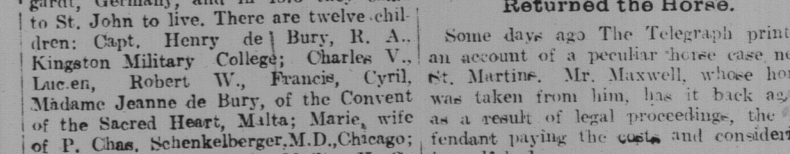
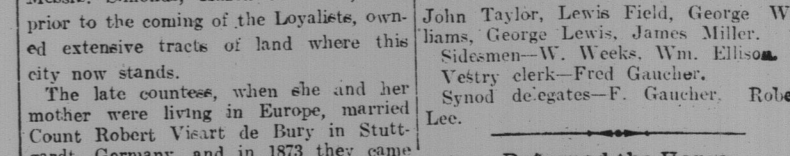
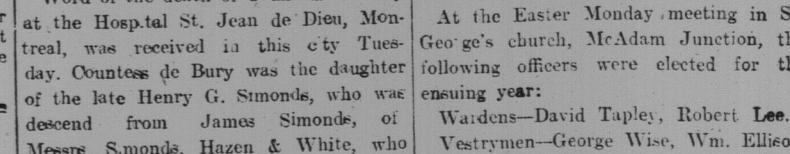
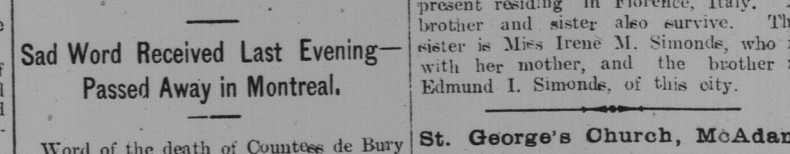
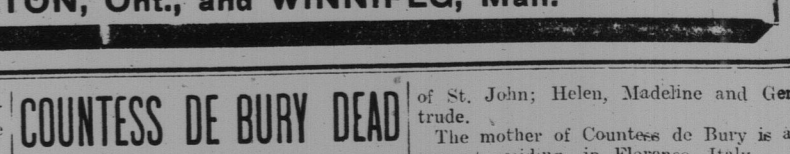
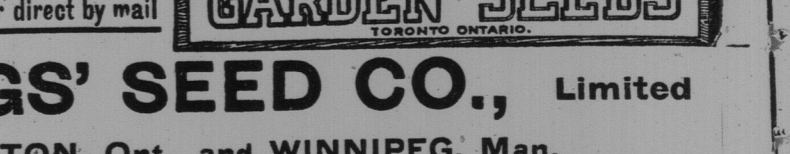
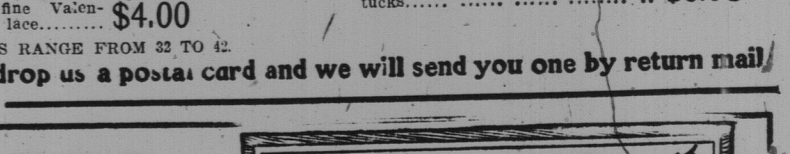
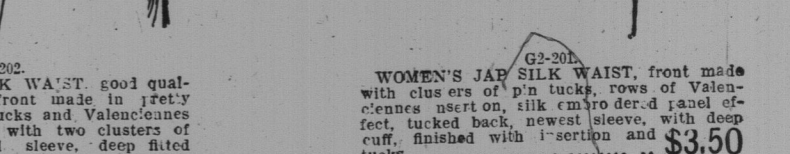
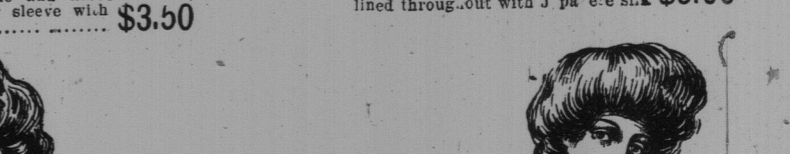
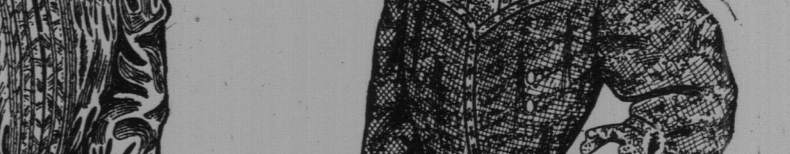
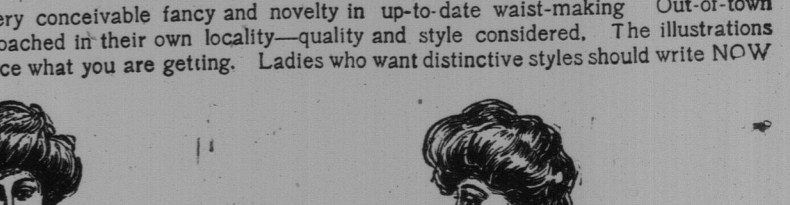
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REV. MR. CAMP HAD CLOSE CALL FROM DROWNING His Horse Got Off the Road and Plunged Into Deep Water
