NEWMAN ERB ELECTED PRESIDENT IN PLACE OF HOYT. NEW COMPRESSOR INSTALLED AT THE MOTHER LODE.

Greenwood, Feb. 29.—Official intimation has been received at the offices of the B. C. Copper company of the retirement of president Colgate Hoyt and the election in his place of Newman Erb, formerly and still chairman of the board of directors of the company.

The election occurred at the first regular meeting of the directors after the meeting of the shareholders. All the other officers were re-elected, making the officials of the company as follows: President and chairman of the board, Newman Erb; vice-presidents, B. B. Lawrence and F. L. Lommer; secretary and treasurer, R. A. Eggleston.

Mr. Erb, while a well known man in the district, is not so well known to the employees of the company generally as was Mr. Hoyt.

S. C. Moss, resident engineer of this division of the C.P.R., stated yesterday that the company would within three weeks undertake the construction work of the line running from here to the Mother Lode. A new grade about three-quarters of a mile in length will be made so as to eliminate the two lower grades on the branch and to decrease the curvature. The change will not greatly affect the sharpness of the grade. About 40 men will be required on the work, which involves an expenditure of about \$25,000.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED

VERDICT OF JURY ON DEATH OF MIKE MOYLAN. MUCH PUBLIC INTEREST TAKEN IN INQUEST.

(Special to The Daily News) Grand Forks, March 4.—Never in the history of Grand Forks has so much public interest been taken in an inquest as that taken at the inquest on the death of Mike Moylan, a well known local miner, who died in connection with the death of the late Mike Moylan, who was accidentally killed at the Mother Lode smelter a couple of days ago, by falling under the engine of a slag train.

At the inquest several witnesses were heard, probably however, the most important was engineer Taylor and an Italian laborer named Frank Wlosok. Engineer Taylor in his evidence stated that when he heard Moylan's shriek he felt his engine bumping over something and for the moment he thought he was on a track. He left the track, and as he once stopped, within a space of some six feet and jumped down to see what was the matter. When he saw a man under the engine he blew his whistle, and the engine was stopped from under the engine. He could not understand how the accident occurred.

The other witness, Frank Wlosok, the Italian, stated that he was at work in the plumb line just across the track from where the accident occurred. He saw the deceased jump in the usual way, with outstretched hands to catch the front part of the engine and that was the last he saw of the deceased.

Several other witnesses, employees of the Granby company were heard. The local labor union has taken a great interest in the inquest. The purpose of the verdict rendered by the jury was that the accident came to his death accidentally, but that in the future the Granby company should keep sufficient men on the works to prevent the accumulation of waste material in the yards.

WANTS UNIVERSITY

SUICIDE IN MONTREAL

Montreal, March 6.—D. A. Reinhardt, a well known lawyer, took his life this afternoon while in a state of mental aberration. Mr. Reinhardt was the head of the Reinhardt Manufacturing company until recently, when he had a nervous breakdown, followed by a mental collapse. At his home today he eluded watchers and going into the kitchen secured a heavy carving knife, which he carried to the conservatory and stabbed himself several times in the abdomen. He died shortly afterwards.
