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SEVEN

In seven days the United States has been crossed by a closed automobile, establishing a feat of significance to two industries—the automobile and the moving picture. Actual running time for 3,570 miles was 96 hours, 15 minutes. The car was a stock model Studebaker Standard Six Coach.

A remarkable feature of the run was that a trained endurance driver, a vegetarian living on California fruit, gave up the drive at Kansas City when his home state products ran out, and the rest of the run was made in record time by an amateur who never had attempted such driving.

This, with the fact the car was a stock model Studebaker Standard Six Coach taken off the sales floor at Los Angeles, made the record run more nearly akin to the experience of the average motor car driver than any similar run ever made.

Mike H. Newman, is the man who brought the Coach from Kansas City, where it was two hours behind schedule, into New York City two hours ahead of running time, after having rested 15 extra hours in Philadelphia. The Coach carried the first prints of a Christie moving picture comedy, "Seven Days" for a preview showing in New York. Along the route time was taken for a number of preview showings in the larger cities, and this is expected to open a new era in motion picture exhibition.

New Feature For Movies

Heretofore, these first showings were made only in Los Angeles, San Francisco and New York. The rest of the country had to wait until the film had made its premier runs in these cities, not seeing the best films for several weeks later.

As a result of the success of this run, particularly with a driver untrained in endurance driving, the Christie Company plans to open the rest of the country to premier showings of their more important films hereafter, so that almost every principal city in America will have opportunity as soon as New York or Los Angeles, to see these previews before the film gets into general circulation. Thus the films will be "sold" by the time they reach the principal centres of population, and the moving picture business will have a larger number of "first showing" centres which will result in increased patronage.

To do this by rail transportation would mean employment of a number of crews, whereas the automobile has been shown by this run capable of doing this work with one crew, moving when and where it will.

Trouble-Free Trip

The car left Los Angeles on August 26 on the spot of the starting gun fired by Mayor George Cryer. An immense crowd cheered the drivers on their way.

Mr. Newman arrived at the Colony Theater, New York City, 12.30 noon, daylight, saving time, September 2, making his cross-country run record with the name of the film "Seven Days" which Lilyan Tashman, Lillian Rich, Natalie Joyce and Sallie Kid star.

No mechanical difficulty of any kind was experienced on the trip. Though it was a brand new Studebaker Coach, an average of 16 1/2 miles to the gallon of gasoline was achieved. The car arrived in New York in perfect condition, as did the drivers, who enthusiastically proclaimed the Studebaker Coach the "sweetest running car" he had ever seen.
