DISTRICT AND GENERAL
Mrs. Daniel Erskine died at her
home near Campbellton on Thursday
evening, aged 58 years.
The Farmers' Sun, organ of the
U.F.O., has had a loss of \$15,161 for
the past fifteen months.
Two pupils of the Lucan high
school are laid up with broken legs
sustained while playing ball.
Forty thousand Christmas trees
were shipped from Warton to the
States during the past week.
Alexander McKellar, one of Strath-
roy's best known citizens, died on
Friday morning, at the age of eighty
years.

Ontario is experiencing the warm-
est December on record. Even yet
no ice has formed on the lakes and
rivers.

McPherson Bros., Parkhill, recent-
ly filled an order for thirty pairs of
Indian clubs for the use of the high
school students.

Thieves broke into Herbert Grif-
fith's garage at Strathroy a few
nights ago and took away a lot of
tires and accessories.

Ratepayers of Dunwich township
will vote at the municipal election
on a by-law to abolish the office of
township road superintendent.

Strathroy fair board are in receipt
of a cheque for \$500 from the Pro-
vincial Agricultural Department as
wet weather insurance, which will
help materially to reduce the loss
sustained through unfavorable wea-
ther at last fall's fair.

The funeral of the late Daniel Mc-
Pherson, who passed away suddenly
at his home, concession 3, Aldboro,
on Tuesday, December 18, took place
from the family residence on Thurs-
day to the Purcell cemetery.

The late Mr. McPherson lived in Aldboro
township all his life and was very
highly respected. He was 69 years
of age.

Newbury's original grist mill, one
of the oldest landmarks of the vil-
lage, is being torn down and remov-
ed. The mill was erected about the
time the Great Western Railway was
built, when the only highways were
bush trails and corduroy roads. In
later years the building was convert-
ed into a cannery factory, an indus-
try which existed for a short time
only.

No trace has been found of Alex.
Tobias, of Moravintown, who was
reported drowned in New Ontario.
He and his companion were trapping
and had established a camp. Mr.
Tobias took his canoe and started to
establish a camp at another point
and return in a few days. When he
did not return his companion insti-
tuted a search, finding his canoe but
no trace of the missing man.

On the last day of December the
new act regulating travel on high-
ways comes into force, imposing
more stringent penalties upon motor-
ists who exceed the speed limit.
Forty miles an hour or over is con-
sidered as reckless driving under its
terms. Penalty is also provided for
attempting to pass moving cars un-
less the travelled portion of the high-
way to the left is free of traffic.

The skeletons of 78 Indians were
unearthed on the farm of George Pip-
cash, near Algoma, about six miles
from Port Lambton. The find was
made by men who were engaged in
removing material from a sand pit
on the farm. Three of the skeletons
were found standing upright, with
stones placed in a circle around
them. Evidence of charcoal was
found within the circle, indicating
that the victims might have been
burned at the stake and then buried.

The Canadian Social Hygiene
Council has passed a strong resolu-
tion in favor of requiring health cer-
tificates as a condition to the issue
of a marriage license. Why wait
until the love germ affects the patient?
To separate the wheat from the chaff
it should be necessary for every per-
son to undergo a medical examina-
tion from fifteen years of age and up-
wards. Then when the young man
proposes to his lady she will not
have to say "yes" but simply "Here's
my certificate, where's yours?"

Many people have money in the
bank and do not think it wrong to
enter a store and charge goods. Why
should your money lie in the savings
bank and draw three per cent. inter-
est, while the merchant has to bor-
row from the bank at the rate of
seven per cent. to meet payment on
the goods he sold you? Do you im-
agine that you are saving anything
by charging goods? If you do you
are mistaken. The merchant has to
charge it to someone. That some-
one is not the cash customer. It is
the customer that lets the bills run.

How much do you do in a year to
boost your community? This is an
individual matter as well as a union
of forces.

One cannot do it with
success and expect to pull the load
while a hundred others go with slack
traces or hang on behind. There are
good times ahead if we all hitch up
properly. Kicking at everything
won't fill the bill—a mule can do
that, but a good word, a willing deed,
a helpful hand or foot will set things
going. Some people buy everything
they need out of town and wonder
why trade does not boom; and others
do the same thing and think other
folks who don't patronize them are
mean. Sometimes it is a good thing
to take the "medicine" we dope out
for others.

There is no class of men who
serve the public faithfully and per-
form their duties with clock-like regu-
larity to beat the rural mail cour-
iers. They are granted no holidays
while the rest of us gad about when
we like; they cannot pick the nice
days for their outings; the pay they
receive is not commensurate with
the present day program; and the
"chores" they are commissioned to
look after and goods asked to con-
vey often require a good memory
and a trailer to accommodate the
freight. Don't blame them if your
letter or paper occasionally does not
reach you according to your way of
figuring—they are not the whole
postal service. Santa Claus time is
here, and if the long whiskered, jolly
old fellow we used to know dropped
a "sugar stick" in the mail box the
smile of appreciation on the cour-
ier's face would do you good if you
could see it.

FORECASTS A MILD SEASON
The strongest winds over the en-
tire globe for 1924 will be on or
about February 5, April 15 to 20, the
first week in June, July 1, October 28
and December 22," stated J. B.
Bowles, of Chatsworth, as he pre-
sented a copy of his weather forecasts
for the coming year. Sailors, fish-
men, farmers and others whose op-
erations depend largely on the wea-
ther will, no doubt, bear these dates
in mind.

For a great many years, with un-
failing regularity, J. B. Bowles has
issued a weather forecast for each
year, and his forecasts have proved
correct such a surprisingly large
number of times that they are eagerly
watched for each season. Note
only are his forecasts widely read in
his own district, but his prognosti-
cations are looked for in many sections
of Ontario and even of the United
States.

Here is what he says about 1924:
January—Very mild and calm. Feb-
ruary—About 5th of the month there
will be quite a storm of wind and
snow. The balance of the month
will be mild, calm and dry. March—
Very mild. April—First half quite
mild and dry, but from the 15th to
the 20th there will be a very pro-
nounced storm of wind, rain and
snow. The remainder of the month
will be very mild. May—Decidedly
warm and dry. June—In the first
ten days there will be very strong
and persistent winds, with heavy
rain and frosts, with a strong possi-
bility of a snowstorm. The balance
of the month will be desperately
warm, with rain in the last week
July—The first week there will be
heavy rains and wind. The remain-
der of the month will be desperately
warm and dry. August—The first
half of the month will be dry and
warm, with the latter half cold and
wet. September—First week will be
cool, and later very warm and dry
until the 27th, when frost and rain
may be expected. October—Very
mild and dry until the 28th, with
strong winds, rain, snow and frost.
November—Decidedly warm and dry.
December—First week very mild;
wind, rain, snow and frost about the
9th. The middle of the month will
be very mild. A genuine wind, rain
and snow storm, and very cold, about
the 22nd.

ELECTRIC SYSTEM OVERLOADED
The Petrolia Topic says:—That
Petrolia and other towns in Western
Ontario are not getting the power
from the Ontario Hydro Electric Sys-
tem they have been paying for has
been evident for some time. Our
street lights are not by any means
as bright as they should be, while in
the homes 60 and sometimes even
100 watt lamps have replaced the 40
watt lamps which formerly served.
The trouble is that the line is over-
loaded. The Ontario Commission
recognizes the fact and plans to
now well under way to build a 110,000
volt line on steel towers in the
spring from London to Sarnia and
thus relieve the load. In the mean-
time the transformers will be step-
ped up another 7 1/2 volts. This
should give better lighting and great-
er power, though it may be hard on
fuses.

A GOOD MOVE
In order that every user of a motor
car may become acquainted with re-
cent changes in the Motor Vehicles
Act a concise synopsis of the law of
the province has been prepared un-
der the direction of the Department
of Public Highways and will be dis-
tributed among motorists of the pro-
vince with 1924 license plates. The
new law, which becomes effective
the first of the new year and super-
sedes all previous statutes relating
to vehicles and public highways, em-
bodies a number of changes.
