

There was a snowstorm in the hills the day McRae was lost and he evidently became exhausted and died from exposure. He was found about 12 miles from Princeton and less than a mile from the camp.

Ottawa, March 12.—Rev. Geo. Bousfield, a prominent Anglican clergyman of Eastview, near Ottawa, is the principal of one of the strangest cases that has ever confronted the Dominion police for a solution. It is alleged that an attempt was made to coerce him at the point of a revolver to consent to being an accomplice in a proposed Bolshevik scheme to take the life of an unknown high Canadlan government official, but the plot was frustrated in the nick of time.
