The world's trotting record for two-year-olds in a race was taken by Boreal, who navigated the third heat in 2.174. Boreal is a bay colt by Boy Bells, dam Roslyn Morn, by Alcantara.

The day was beautifully fine, the attendance mustered 3,000, and two of the fields were exceptionally large, the 2.16 pace having five starters, the 2.24 trot ten and the 2.35 trot eleven. Although the time made must be accounted good, it would have undoubtedly been a second or two better, if the track had not been a bit cuppy The pace was won by that generally re liable mare Gertie B. after a hard struggle with Axtell and Jack the Ripper, who took two heats and one heat respectively, the time being .16½, .16¼, .18¼, .18¼, .19½ and .23.
