Profoundity for the pre-pubescent

The Tennants - Visions of Our Future

Last year, Canada's own Tenants became familiar faces in the music world with their self titled debut LP which spawned the hit single "Sheriff". That song in particular and the album in general bore resemblances to the Police and that elicited a mixed reaction. Some saluted the group as they liked their sound, while others dismissed them as a poor copy of the original.

The Tenants' second effort Visions of Our Future is quite different. The music is basically formula-fitting Pop Rock; while hints of both the Police and Saga come out at certain times, it is indeed rather generic for the most part.

In fact, this album lacks a single "Sheriff"-like cut with a definitE Police sound from beginning to end. Instead, parts of certain songs conjure up images of that group's material. The most obvious

keyboardist Fraser Mac-Dougall and vocalist/guitarist Gary Brown are all very ordinary. They do not get shown up by the added session musi-

cians, either; for instance, Lars Sorensen is featured as a saxophonist on "Reach Out", and his break is so bland that I did not even notice it at first.

Producer Paul Gross puts it all into a nice net package of hit-aspiring top forty songs very obviously aimed towards a young audience, and there is no denying the fact that he and the Tenants have done that job professionally and well. One could almost call Visions Of

Our Future a concept album for the teenybopper somewhat like Styx's early 1983 album Kilroy Was Here (remember is aimed.

Mr. Morono...oops, Mr. Roboto?), and even the futuristic album cover gives

hits to what lies inside. In "Don't Meet Your Heroes", the message is "Don't meet your heroes/It's just a disappointment." Pretty deep stuff, huh?

Sometimes, the boys are just too profound for their own good. "We All Live Here" features a pre-pubescent children's choir called the Phasettes. They sing the title repeatedly to open the track and reappear with the band in an anthematic chorus during the latter throes of the song. When Brown sings "A generation cries out/It would be nice to grow old", it is clear exactly to whom Visions of Our Future
