Dried-apricot jam

1 1/2 lbs. dried apricots
5 lbs. sugar
4 1/2 pints water
20 almonds, blanched and halved
Juice of 2 lemons
Rinse dried apricots thoroughly in tepid water. Drain and let soak 2 days in 4 1/2 pints water. Rub preserving pan with a bit of butter and then pour in apricots and water they were soaked in. Add lemon juice. Boil uncovered for 40 minutes, stirring frequently.
Add sugar, stir until dissolved and pour in almonds, blanched and split in two. Continue cooking over medium heat, stirring often until jam has a nice consistency. Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal at once.
