Here he first sees Jean Denslow and hears her passionate outpouring of aversion to her marriage, to be forced upon her that night, to a Southern officer. Here he also learns of a flank movement to be made by the victorious Southerners upon Rosecrans' untrenched and retreating troops. His effort to warn his army of its dangers throws him into a relation more intimate than cordial with this Lady of the South, and gains him a lieutenancy within the same twenty-four hours. The story of the feud in which the lady is involved, and of King's efforts to serve her and be loyal to his cause, is without doubt the best that Randall Parrish has written.

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
