SUGGESTIONS FOR OCTOBER.—This is a very favorable season for all general repairs that do not require the getting out of heavy frames, etc., which is properly winter work; at all events prepare good protection for all live stock. Pine boards are not so expensive an outside protection as an inside lining of provender.

Soft corn, pumpkins, and grass at this season fatten cattle faster than corn, roots, and oil-cake in winter. The bulk of fiesh should be laid on now, preparatory to the later finishing off.

Butter.—Secure as full a flow of milk as possible, by feeding roots or pumpkins as the pastures full, and add oll-eake, bran, and soft corn, or the like, to produce a maximum yield of butter.

Carrots.—Dig before there is danger of the ground freezing, even very slightly. Keep in the cellar and away from frost. The tops before they are frosted are good feed for cattle.
