EASTER MUSIC IN CITY CHURCHES YESTERDAY

From Monday's Daily.

Easter Sunday, which is always desired to be a bright day of sunshine and spring warmth, was yesterday marked with any but pleasant weather conditions. High winds prevailed until late at evening and the mercury spelled cold weather.

Easter is the great day in the ecclesiastical year and it was not unexpected that the services in the churches would be largely attended. Special music and sermons had been prepared for the occasion. In the Anglican churches the Holy Communion was celebrated with due ceremonial while in St. Michael's high mass was prominent with all its ritual of the Catholic Church.

BRIDGE ST. METHODIST

The congregations of Bridge Street Methodist Church yesterday were very large. The Rev. H. S. Osborne preached in the morning on the theme, "The Resurrection." The Easter music was an important feature. Mr. Dan A. Cameron, choir leader in charge. The numbers were:

ST. THOMAS ANGLICAN

Rev. Canon Beamish was in charge of the Easter services at St. Thomas Church yesterday. Holy Communion was celebrated at seven, eight and eleven o'clock. The latter being fully choral. Stainer's service was sung by the choir. Prof. Wheatley presiding at the organ. Miss Strathelton sang a solo. Altogether 248 partook of the Holy Communion.

In the afternoon children's festival service was held in the school. Mission boxes were presented and Mr. John Elliott addressed the children on an Easter theme.

Evangelism by Maund was sung, the Rev. Canon Beamish presiding on the Resurrection. The offerings for the day amounted to \$326.

The sanctuary was decorated with flowers of the season.

ST. MICHAEL'S

The great festival of Easter was observed in the customary solemn manner at St. Michael's. Huge congregations were in attendance at both masses, and at the early celebration the number of communicants was noticeably large.

The Rector of the parish, Rev. C. J. Killean, was the celebrant at the 8 o'clock mass, and the Curate, Rev. J. Corrigan, at the 10:30 High Mass. A sermon, appropriate to the day, was delivered at each service. At high mass the music selected was one of T. Marzocchi's productions, and an exceedingly beautiful one. The choir, all men rendered their several parts well, and judging by the comments afterwards heard, the congregation was more than pleased at the efforts of the young men. The soloists were Messrs. Tom Barrett, Ed Brown, Jno. Fahey and R. Haind, and those singing in the quartettes were Messrs. C. J. Poppa, J. V. Doyle, T. Barrett, J. Roe and Jno. Fahey. At the offertory, Mr. Tom Barrett sang "Regina Coeli" in a clear, strong voice. Miss Agnes St. Charles, the capable and painstaking organist of the church, deserves very much credit for the success of the mass. At Benediction "O Salutaris" of Borde's was sung.

VICTORIA AVENUE BAPTIST

Large congregations attended Victoria Avenue Baptist church on Easter Sunday. The pastor, Rev. Chas. G. Smith, B.A., D.D., in the morning spoke on "The Doctrine of the Resurrection," which is the foundation stone of the Gospel, the proof of all miracles and the hope of immortality. The choir under the direction of Mr. W. B. Riggs sang the anthem "Christ is Risen." The evening saw eleven candidates baptized into the Baptist church by the pastor. During the service the choir sang an anthem from the oratorio "Christ and His Soldiers" a mixed quartette sang "The Holy City." Miss Margaret Brown, soloist, sang the solo parts in the music of the day. Miss Wanda Riggs presided at the piano.

Short addresses were delivered by Rev. Kelly and Rev. A. S. Kerr, pastor, on "Easter." The superintendent, Mr. Wm. McIntosh, read a report of the last quarter's progress of the school.

HOLLOWAY ST. METHODIST

The Rev. A. R. Sanderson, pastor, was in charge of the Easter services at Holloway Street Methodist church yesterday. His sermons were "An Easter Message" and "The Lordship of Christ." Mrs. (Dr.) A. E. MacColl, choir-leader and organist, had arranged a most attractive musical service which included the following—Anthem—"Awake Thou that Sleepest!" Dyke's "Te Deum"; Rodney's "Resurrection Morn" sung by Mrs. A. R. Sanderson. Evening—Anthem—"They have Taken Away My Lord"—Stainer. EMMANUEL REFORMED EPISCOPAL

The Rev. A. M. Hubby, rector of Emmanuel Reformed Episcopal church, preached to large congregations on Easter Sunday. The services were bright and inspiring. In the morning the choir sang Simpson's "King of Kings" and in the evening "Praise, Praise to Thee" (Hewitt). At the morning service the rector gave an exposition of Scripture leading the congregation from the upper room to the "Hall" of Jesus on Easter morning. Currie, preached at the morning service from the text of 1 Cor. 15:20—"Now hath Christ been raised from the dead, the first fruits of a harvest that is to come."

The musical services were in charge of Miss Mayel Stork, choir leader and Miss E. Wallace, organist. The vocal numbers were as follows—quartet "Wake up, My Glory" (Miss Stork, Miss Eva LaVoie, Mr. E. Ridgway and Mr. M. LaVoie), solo by Miss E. LaVoie—"There is a Green Hill" anthem—"O Lord of Life," the soloist being Miss Jean Sinclair. Evening anthem—"Hosanna," the solo part being taken by Miss Luella Curry, quartette "Crossing the Bar" (Misses Stork and LaVoie, and Messrs. Ridgway and LaVoie); anthem "Christ our Passover," the soloist being Miss Stork. Mr. W. B. Ellis and Mr. LaVoie solo "The Resurrection" by Miss Mayel Stork. The organ numbers were appropriate for the day.

TABERNACLE CHURCH

The services at the Tabernacle yesterday were most interesting and successful. Large congregations were present. The Rev. W. B.
