Death of a Gallant Soldier

Major Davidson Houston writes as follows:—

"It is with the deepest sympathy on behalf of all of us that I write to say that Lionel was killed yesterday about 6 p.m. while very gallantly leading one of our companies to attack some trenches which the Germans had captured from us an hour or two earlier.

He was shot just as we jumped to the trenches, the first man of them all. His death was instantaneous, and for a soldier could not have been better at the moment of victory, for we took the trenches and held them though I fear his and other officers' deaths are a heavy penalty to pay.

Since we have been at the front he has shown on more than one occasion his dash to times of danger, and I mentioned him specially to the C. O. C. for his pluck in dashing out of a trench in heavy fire a few days ago to pull a party of our men together who were getting shaky in a trench nearby. He will be a great loss to us in this campaign, as one could always depend upon him to pull things out of a tight corner."

The Girl Scouts of Newfoundland have been organized, and during the past fortnight have undergone a good deal of instruction. The chief scout is Miss Alice Smeaton and a number of prominent ladies of St. John's have joined as instructors. Patrols have been organized in several of the leading ladies' schools, and in afternoons at present is about 140 and girls are the object of this movement is to give the girls exercise and to enable them to obtain valuable instruction in subject not usually taught in the schools. Arrangements have been made for instruction in swimming, field drill and exercises, field botany, photography, first aid and hygiene, cooking and camp life.

Many prominent ladies are sponsors in this movement which promises to be very beneficial to the girls. The various patrols may be seen in the streets wearing their badges which consist of a dark blue arm band with the letter denoting the particular patrol to which they belong.

The Girl Scouts in Britain are rendering great assistance in the country hospitals and convalescent camps and it is believed that the organization here will be ready to render similar beneficial assistance whenever occasions arise.
