We might ask ourselves the question, will they all return or will any of them be missing from our fleet, as was the unfortunate "Pendragon" last year. On July 16th 1914 she sailed out of Exploits Bay commanded by Captain Henry Evans. We have no doubt but all on board was expecting a pleasant time to the Labrador Coast, and their friends home were hoping they would be favored with success and brought safely home again when the fishing on Labrador was ended for that season. But it was otherwise, and we are led to think that the "Pendragon" never reached the Labrador Coast, but how and where that awful disaster took place we know not, it is a mystery to us that will never be made known to us in this life.

Such a tragedy was never known in Notre Dame Bay before. There have been schooners and men lost which has caused sorrow, but such as the
