REBELS MAY CAUSE TROUBLE

(Continued from Page 1) the international border as a precaution against possible disorders and for any other eventualities. In addition to the movement of land troops the naval strength of the United States in Mexican waters is to be increased by a special service squadron.

Considerable uneasiness continued to be felt here over rumors of anti-American demonstrations in Mexico City, where there are still many United States citizens and over more definite reports of similar troubles at Ensenada on the west coast of Mexico where it was reported last night that the American consulate had been attacked. Steps were immediately taken to afford relief in the latter case by the despatch of a gunboat from San Diego. Word of its arrival at Ensenada was hurriedly expected.

The tenseness of the situation between the United States and Mexico was heightened by the outward vicinities seen in the severing of all formal connections between the two countries by the almost simultaneous departure from Washington of Mexican Charge Algara and from Mexico City of Charge O'Shaughnessy. Mr. Algara left for Toronto, Canada, last night, while Mr. O'Shaughnessy went to Vera Cruz.

Considerable significance is seen in the selection of Brazil to look after American interests in Mexico, in the absence of United States representatives. Where Brazil is not represented American interests will be cared for by France.

Scenes of activity were in evidence early to-day at the various departments of the government, immediately concerned with the Mexican situation. Despite the fact that cabinet officers and their clerical forces were at the department at a late hour last night they were at their desks early to-day prepared to meet any further exigencies that might arise. In the meantime members of congress are giving the closest attention to developments and it is considered not improbable that action bearing upon the situation may be taken by congress.

CHANCE IS TICKLED. Manager Frank Chance of the New Yorks, is very much delighted with the spirit of his players and believes he will have a real ball club before the end of the season.

"You should have heard them around the club house the day after they trimmed the Athletics so badly before the opening crowd," he said. "Talk of pepper! Why, those kids actually believed they had the pennant won."

"Hey, Frank, let me at 'em to-day," said Ray Keating. "I'll stand those world's champions on their ears."

"Keating's confidence was characteristic of the team. And, it wasn't conceit, either. They talked the same way before the game started. It is the kind of spirit that will get all out of a team it possibly possesses. It was the same spirit that made the old Cubs so grand a ball team."

"There never was a greater team than the Cubs," said Chance. "Jan for man the Athletics of to-day would outlast them. But Mack's world's champions lack their old fighting spirit."

You never saw the Cubs snaking to-day. They played with brains in 1908 on the last trip east, not one of us ever spoke to a rival save to bow him out or taunt him. We dropped a couple of games to Boston, but from there we visited New York, Philadelphia and Brooklyn without being stopped."

"I shall never forget the melancholy of Overall when Cincinnati finally broke our winning streak. Up to the ninth he had the Reds beaten, 1 for 1. They got to him then and crowded over three runs. Two were on bases with two out, when Bobbee Bescher got big Jeff in a hole. He looked to me for instructions and I told him to depend on the old reliable machine behind him. Well, Bescher singled and won the game."

"That night Evers came to me and told me to watch Overall. He had fretted so much over an assumed mistake, which was really mine if anybody's that he was threatening to commit suicide. Almer Brown, his room mate, secretly watched him all night long. That's the spirit of my old-time Cubs, and my new time New Yorks seem to have caught the spark."

Ancient Copper Mines. Men are now at work at the ancient copper mines at Alderley, which have been taken on a long lease from Lord Sheffield by Mr. A. Gibbs, of London. Works have been erected, and a railway put down to the entrance to the workings for the carriage of copper ore.

Four Times Married. The death has occurred at Northampton at the age of eighty-two of Jacob Abraham, believed to be the first professional cricketer Northampton produced. He was from 1856 to 1868 coach to Exeter College, Oxford. He was four times married and his widow has lost four husbands.

War Bulletins Over the Wire Are Numerous

(By Special Wire to The Courier) Hold Up Arms.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Orders to hold up all shipments of arms across the Mexican border were sent to-day by the treasury department to all collectors of customs. The orders are in co-operation with the war departments efforts to enforce the embargo. Collectors were notified to hold all shipments of arms "until further notice."

A Guard Put On. LONDON, April 24.—The Daily Mail's Mexico City despatch, dated Thursday, says:

"A military guard was placed on the United States embassy this afternoon. The arms and ammunition, which had been there for some time, were removed, as they were considered unnecessary, in view of the protection afforded by the Mexican Government."

"The life of the city is almost normal, many shops have their shutters up, but nearly all are open. Some of the British residents are bearing rosettes of the British colors. Many Americans remain and may be seen in the streets."

"There have been some processions with flags, but no disorderliness worth mentioning."

Shipping Explosives. STONY POINT, N. Y., April 24.—The largest shipment of explosives and ammunition since the Spanish-American war left the Jonia Island naval arsenal yesterday. The consignment of powder, shells and explosives, weighing about 200,000 pounds, was conveyed on tugs to warships stationed at the New York navy yard. Ammunition has been leaving the island for ten days, the total shipments to date, aggregate, including the shells, more than a million pounds.

Marines On March. NEW YORK, April 24.—A detachment of 100 marines in heavy service impedimenta marching down Fifth avenue yesterday, furnished the first martial display in connection with the hostilities in Mexico seen on the streets of New York. The detachment, made up of marines from the barracks at Portsmouth, N. H., and Boston, Mass., marched on the Grand Central to the Pennsylvania Railroad station, where they entrained for Philadelphia to join other marines to sail on the Morro Castle. The rhythmic footsteps of the marchers brought a crowd to Fifth avenue and cheers were frequent along the few blocks of the line of march.

The squad was joined in Jersey City by a squad of seventy eight men from the New York navy yard.

No Intervention. WASHINGTON, April 24.—Diplomatic officials here today denied reports that Thomas B. Hoeller, charge of the British embassy at Mexico City, had been sent to confer with Admiral Fletcher at Vera Cruz with a view to opening diplomatic negotiations for a solution of the Mexican difficulty.

Most of the homeless have gone to seek refuge with friends on Calumet Island, Portage du Fort, Shawville, Campbell's Bay and other nearby places. The loss is about \$100,000.

Territorial Wounded. Private Samuel Muir, twenty-two, of Town End, Chapel-en-le-Frith, a Territorial, is confined to bed disabled by a pistol shot in the leg. He was going to the Drill Hall when there was a loud report, and he fell. He had a loaded revolver in one of his trouser pockets which was accidentally discharged. The bullet entered his thigh.
