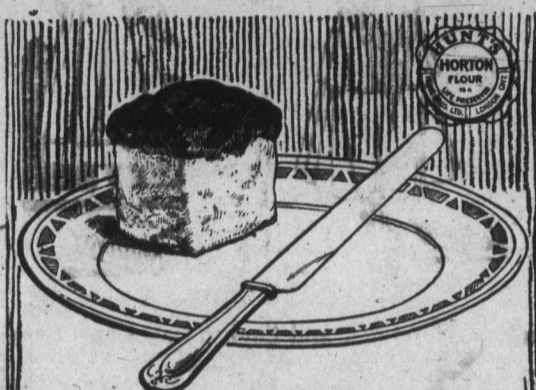

Sir Sam Hughes Estimates Colchester Man's Song Enthused that Number Young Canadians To Join the Colors.

We are pleased to have a call Monday morning from a Colchester lad who has got more soldiers for the Empire in Canada than any other one Canadian, A. E. McNutt, composer of that song now sung the Empire over, "We Never Let the Old Flag Fall."

As stated in these columns some time ago Mr. McNutt was born at Salmon River, Truro, a son of the late Foster McNutt, of that place, and nephew of Mrs. James McNutt, Salmon River, with whom he spent Sunday, his home being in Moncton.

His brother James, who enlisted for overseas at St. John in the 66th, and who met with an accident before the battalion sailed by which he was permanently disabled, is stopping with his aunt above mentioned.

Toronto publishers will in the course of a few days publish another composition of Mr. McNutt's, entitled, "When There is World Peace"

Sir Sam Hughes, complimenting "We'll Never Let the Old Flag Fall," intimated that it had been the means of enlisting fully ten thousand young Canadians to join the colors. Mr. McNutt is a goldsmith by trade, and conducts a business in Moncton.—Colchester Sun.

TOMMY ATKINS

The name of Tommy Atkins, which is universally applied to the British soldier, originated at the time of the Indian Mutiny. When the rebellion broke out in Lucknow all the Europeans fled to the Residency. On their way they came across a private of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, who was on sentry duty at an outpost. They urged him to make his escape with them, but he refused to leave his post and was killed. His name happened to be Tommy Atkins, and whenever a deed of exceptional daring was performed during the Mutiny the deed was said to be "a regular Tommy Atkins." Since then the expression has been used in a more general sense, and now applies to all British soldiers.

CANADA UNDER PROHIBITION.

Ontario's step into prohibition leaves Quebec the only Province in the Dominion in which by this time next year it will be legal to sell liquor by retail. The Pioneer gives the following list of the last dates on which it was, or will be lawful to sell liquor by retail in the different parts of the Dominion of Canada:

- Prince Edward Island, 1901.
- Saskatchewan — June 30th, 1915.
- Manitoba—May 31st, 1916
- Nova Scotia—June 29th, 1916
- Alberta—June 30th, 1916.
- Ontario—Sept. 16th, 1916.
- New Brunswick—April 30th, 1917.
- British Columbia—June 30th, 1917.
- Yukon Territory—July 13th, 1917.

219TH BATTALION WINS FIRST AID COMPETITION

The 219th Battalion which recently won the Borden Shield has again won the coveted laurels by winning first place in a keenly contested competition in First Aid to the Wounded.

On Saturday last, before thousands of spectators at Aldershot camp, in a unique display of how stretcher bearers work under fire on the battlefield, their squad of four men, consisting of Privates D. F. McGuire, Halifax; H. L. Porter, Acadia; R. C. Murphy, Halifax, and A. G. Penny, Berwick, won out in open competition against three picked teams from the 85th, 185th and 193rd battalions. These men have been trained throughout the summer under the most efficient instruction of W. M. S. I. J. Redfern, C. A. M. C., ably assisted by Sergeant P. M. Hamilton of the 219th medical office.

The 219th led by 1 minute and 18 seconds over their closest competitor, the 193rd, which teams put up a close argument for the championship. This test reveals the splendid efficiency of the training which these men are receiving in first aid. Capt. Churchill, medical officer of the 219th has been receiving congratulations on the splendid conduct of his team, and the men rest assured that on the day of battle their wounds will be attended to with the greatest of care and speed.
