REGINA CELEBRATES DOMINION DAY

Hot Weather and Large Crowds—Loose Jaw Man Wins Standard Road Race—Winners of Athletic Events—Regina and Brandon Win a Game of Baseball Each—Barnstormers Defeated.

July 1st was celebrated in a busy manner in Regina. There was practically something doing all the time. The weather was clear, bright and as hot a day as we have had this year. The town was crowded with visitors from different parts of Saskatchewan.

The morning attraction was the baseball match between the professional teams of Brandon and Regina, the former winning out by a score of 4-0. There was also a bicycle race at the fair grounds in the morning.

The attractions in the afternoon were at the exhibition grounds and the lively men did a big business as did also the C.P.R. which ran trains to and from the grounds.

STANDARD ROAD RACE.
The first event was the Standard road race. There had been 21 entries for the race, but only the following 16 started:

N. B. Read, Fairville; Harry Turney, Pense; W. Forsythe, Caron; Jas. Gordon, Grand Coulee; Ed. Marat, Moose Jaw; Felix Penepalesse, Grenfell; Chas. H. Still, Rouleau; Chas. R. Swan, Fairville; Julian Heincke, Saskatoon; Clarence Cosman, Regina; A. Birwhistle, R.N.W.M.P.; H. B. George, Regina; W. J. Peverett, Regina; Arthur Taylor, Saskatoon; Edward Jarvis, Regina; E. G. Jas. Balfour started the runners at 1.54. After running two miles Jarvis and Turney dropped out. Swan left the track after running two and a half miles. By the end of the fifth mile only six runners were left. Forsythe gave up after the eighth mile. The Indian gave up in the eighth, but was induced to go on again. He also gave up in the 9th, but was again induced to try and eventually won third place.

Marat came in first, beating Cosman, who came next by 18 seconds. The Indian and Peverett had to race for third place. A little sprint on the part of the Indian overcame Peverett's lead and won for him the place. The first man in, in each mile, had his time recorded as follows:

8—Marat, 50 min., 22 sec.

10—Marat, 1 hour, 3 min., 36 sec.

The winner holds a silver cup for one year. This cup practically ennobles him to the championship 10 mile foot race for Saskatchewan. He holds the cup for one year, but receives a gold medal for his own property.

The second prize is a silver medal and the third prize a bronze medal.

HORSE RACES
The horse racing events were held at intervals during the afternoon and resulted as follows:
The half mile free-for-all was contested by R. J. Hill's "Black Tom" and McPherson & McDermott's "Sam and Uel". The latter horse won the 1st, 3rd and 4th heats and under went 1st Hill's "Minnie B." 2nd Wright's "Black Tony".
The gentlemen's road race went as follows: 1st, Le Bleu, owned by J. F. Lunney; 2nd, Lou Bars, owned by J. F. Hole; and 3rd Billie M owned by W. H. Mulligan.
The Shetland pony race went as follows: 1st, Mulligan's "Mina"; 2nd, McDermott's "Frank"; 3rd, Loverock's "Gritie".

TUG-OF-WAR
The tug of war was won by a team composed of Grand Coulee Grain Growers. Other contestants were two teams from the R.N.W.M.P., a team from the C.P.R. and one from the 35th regiment.

Many women of note from various countries were visitors in Regina yesterday. The travelling party of the International Council of Women which convened recently in Toronto and afterwards started on a tour across the continent, reached Regina at 9.15 over the C.P.R. They were welcomed at the station by a deputation from the Regina Council consisting of Mrs. Rothwell, Mrs. J. K. R. Williams, Mrs. Morell, Mrs. J. W. Smith, Mrs. J. R. Peverett, Mrs. G. C. Hill, Mrs. J. C. Pope and others. Mayor Williams and City Clerk Hunter were also at the depot. Carriages were in waiting at the station and the ladies were taken around the city and at eleven o'clock were dined at the King's hotel.

Before the meal was served, Mrs. Rothwell, president of the local council read the following address: "To the Women's Council of Women: Ladies—It is requested by the Mayor to extend on behalf of the mayor and aldermen and the citizens of Regina a hearty welcome to the World's Council of Women on their visit to Regina."
