AGREED UPON

Regarding the Execution of the Offend Escape Death.

London, Feb. 21.—"At their latest meeting," says the Pekin correspon-dent of the Morning Post, wiring yes-terday, "the foreign envoys agreed to terday, "the foreign envoys agreed to a compromise. They propose to per-mit the imperial court to commute the sentences of decapitation in the cases of Prince Tuan, Duke Lan and Gen. Tung Fu Hsuang to life imprisonment, and will agree to the following pun-Shments:
"Prince Chwang to be strangled, Yu

"Prince Chwang to be strangled, Yu Hsien to be decapitated, Chao Shu Chiao and Ying Nien to be permitted to strangle themselves, and Chi Hsin and Hsu Scheng Wu to be beheaded in Pekin. If the court advances no new obstacle the negotiations on the first points of the demands of the powers may be considered closed."

Four bodies only have so far been re-covered from the B. C. mine, where the ate disaster occurred.


