## THE CZAR VENTURES 'OUT

He Will Spend A Week At  
The Guards' Camp At  
Krasnoe-Selo

IS TO BE WELL GUARDED

St. Petersburg, Aug. 15.—In spite of the attempt on the life of Grand Duke Nicholas Nikolaevich on Aug. 10 at Krasnoe-Selo, the Emperor, accompanied by his entire family and the major portion of the court, has gone to Krasnoe-Selo to spend a week at the Guards' camp.

Six additional guard regiments have gone to the camp from St. Petersburg, and the most rigid precautions have been taken to protect the Emperor's life during his stay. The railroad station at St. Petersburg is heavily guarded, and no civilians are allowed to leave there for Krasnoe-Selo except after being fully identified.

The authorities attach great importance to the capture of revolutionists at Moscow and in the vicinity during the last few days, believing that they have broken up the headquarters of the military fighting organization and have arrested the leaders.

Strict Rule at Odessa.  
Odessa, Aug. 15.—Governor-General Kaibers yesterday issued an edict decreeing that employers indemnifying strikers for the days the latter had been on strike would henceforth incur penalties for so doing, including the closing of their factories. The same edict enjoins the inhabitants from whom money has been extorted by anarchists under threat of assassination to report the facts to the police, failing which they will be considered to be protectors of anarchists.

Two political prisoners here saturated their mattresses with petroleum Monday night and set fire to them. One man was burned to death and the other was rescued with difficulty. Beginning yesterday, a special military guard will be attached to all trains in order to prevent robberies.

Join the Church.  
Mohlrev, Russia, Aug. 15.—Since the publication of the decree granting freedom of conscience almost 220,000 members of the orthodox church, a majority of whom are peasants, have embraced the Roman Catholic religion in this bishopric.

### NINETY-EIGHT LIVES LOST.

In the Fire Which Destroyed Greater Part of Syzran, Russia.

Syzran, Russia, Aug. 15.—Since the fire which destroyed the greater part of this city, July 19, ninety-eight persons have been missing and it is thought they perished in the conflagration and that their bodies were consumed.

### HIS MAJESTY DEPARTS.

European Diplomats on Edge Over Meeting With the Kaiser.

London, Aug. 15.—King Edward left London yesterday for the Continent, traveling to Port Victoria by special train, and crossing the North Sea to Flushing, where he landed last evening, on the royal yacht Victoria and Albert, which will be conveyed by two British cruisers.

The German and Austrian ambassadors were among those assembled at the railroad station to see the King off. The greatest interest is manifested in the meeting between King Edward and Emperor William, which is expected to take place at Friederichshof, Aug. 15.

### ACCUSED MRS. MILLER.

"You Killed My Woman," Brident Said to Her.

Toronto, Aug. 15.—Detective Sergt. Dunn gave new evidence in the Brident case yesterday, when he stated that Brident, when Mrs. Miller had told him she didn't know the condition of Mrs. Brident when the pills were sold to her, replied: "You killed my woman."

Mr. Neville, for Brident, wanted the evidence of residents in the Bristol apartments taken, but the magistrate declined to hear them until a later date.

Mr. Robinette asked that Mrs. Miller be discharged, but the magistrate said he wouldn't think of considering the request.

Robinette, K. C., asked for an immediate hearing of the Wright and Lenoir charges, but Mr. Corley said he would be unable to proceed until after Sept. 1.

### Railway Passes Void.

Omaha, Aug. 15.—All the middle western railroads have ordered all passes cancelled after Aug. 28 and hundreds of passes supposed to be good for the entire year will be called in on the day the new rate law goes into effect.

### To Trial For Manslaughter.

Montreal, Aug. 15.—The two Casteaus, father and son, who were arrested for manslaughter in connection with the death of M. C. Casteau, 16 years of age, yesterday were committed for trial.

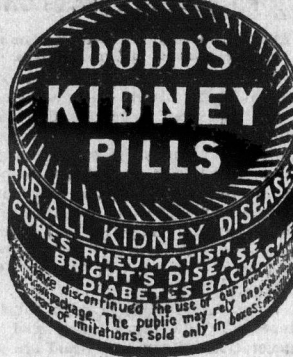
### Jap-Russ Convention.

Toronto, Aug. 15.—It was an enormous contingent that took advantage of the C. P. R. excursion to the Northwest yesterday. ### Pole-Carew Retired.

London, Aug. 15.—Major-General Sir Reginald Pole-Carew, since 1903 commander of the 8th Division of the 3rd Army Corps, and who distinguished himself in Asia and African campaigns, has been retired with the honorary rank of lieutenant-general. Gen. Pole-Carew is 58 years of age.

### New Zealand Wants Moose.

Ottawa, Aug. 15.—A cable has been received at the State Department from Sir Joseph Ward, Prime Minister of New Zealand, asking Canada to furnish his country with twenty young moose, fifteen females and five males. Sir Joseph offers to send Canada in exchange twenty red deer.

### Hobbs Pleads Not Guilty.

Montreal, Aug. 15.—David Hobbs, the C. P. R. customs clerk, who is accused of forgery to the extent of \$64,000, pleaded not guilty when called up for voluntary statement, and chose to be tried in the court of special sessions.

## SETTLEMENT IS EXPECTED

A New Master Carpenters' Exchange Is Formed In Toronto

PERFECTLY ORGANIZED

Toronto, Aug. 15.—The strike situation took upon itself a much more amiable turn yesterday afternoon when the master carpenters formed an association and sent over their executive to the Labor Temple to meet the executive of the carpenters' union with a view to finding out what the strikers really wanted. The meeting of the two bodies was a cordial one.

The union representatives stated plainly that their demand was for a minimum rate wage of 33c. per hour, had recognition of the union in disputes, there were other little matters mentioned, which will come up at a meeting of the new master carpenters' association to-night.

The attitude of the masters seems to be toward speedy settlement, and there is apparently a joint feeling of ill-will toward the Builders' Exchange and The Sympathetic Strikers.

The order of the Federated Building Trades Council for men to go out was obeyed in various branches of the trades when work was shut down on some building last night, but just to what extent cannot be determined until the reports come in to-day. There is no doubt about it that in some of the bodies it meets with a lot of criticism.

### Master Carpenters Organize.

A representative gathering of master carpenters assembled at Williams' Restaurant yesterday afternoon to discuss the situation and to form an organization for mutual protection, and with a view to dealing with the unions.

There were about sixty master carpenters at the organization meeting, and though they differed considerably as to detail they were practically unanimous that some scheme must be devised to get the strike called off, although, of course, they desire peace with honor. Of the firms represented, thirty-seven became enrolled for membership.

The officers chosen were: President, J. T. V. May; vice-president, Thomas Jones; secretary, Arthur Laxton; treasurer, T. Westlake; committee, Frank Lloyd, F. R. Baumhard, J. E. Denise. A general committee to draft a constitution will be appointed to-night at a meeting, when the executive will report the result of the conference with the strikers. An effort is being made to get as many of the master carpenters present as possible so that any suggested settlement can be fully discussed.

### MAD MULLAH REPULSED.

After Devastating 19 Villages, He Bumps Into Sultan.

London, Aug. 15.—According to the correspondent at Aden of The Daily Mail, after devastating nineteen Oaden villages, the Mad Mullah, inflated by his success, attacked the Sultan of Mifertain territory. Both sides lost heavily. The Sultan had nine near relatives and 700 warriors killed, but eventually repulsed the Mullah towards Illig and the coast.

### Willed By Lightning.

Aberdeen, Sask., Aug. 15.—Alex. Greenhouse, carpenter, while at work in a house here, met a tragic death yesterday morning. A flash of lightning from a single cloud passing over the town, and the only one observed, struck the corner of the building, shattering it and instantly killing Greenhouse and seriously injuring three other men, Fred Rickard, George Stott and C. Middleton. Greenhouse was a young man, and leaves a widow and child.

### Oil In Harwich?

McKay's Corners, Aug. 15.—This community is being over-run with representatives of oil companies leasing farms in block where possible. A number of these men say they will put down a test well inside of 90 days if can lease at least 1,000 acres. There is to be a public meeting held this Wednesday evening to meet with a number of these gentlemen.
