Solid Emery Wheels.

In the production of solid emery wheels the best cement that can be employed is one that binds the emery together with that degree of strength which will resist the centrifugal strain due to the high speed at which emery wheels cut best—about 5,000 feet speed per minute. It must not soften by frictional heat or glaze or burst or be-come brittle and break with cold, nor must it hold the cutting grains until must it hold the cutting grains until
they are too dull to cut nor release
them so readily as to waste away the
wheel too fast. It must be capable of
being thoroughly mixed evenly with
the grain emery, so that the wheel may
not have either hard or soft spots and
be out of balance, and must also be capable of being tempered to suit dif-ferent kinds of metal or work. Great care and skill are required in the mat-ter of selecting only pure and strong chemicals for these cements.—Cassier's Magazine.
