## S. S. Convention.

The Kings Co. Sabbath School Convention will be held in Canning on Tuesday next, Aug. 17th, the first session opening in the Free Baptist Church at 10 a. m.

Lydard, collided with Bill's bike, smashing it badly. Shango was drawn after the accident. Lady Rampart and Libretto were much admired by horsemen. Willmont is a very handsome colt, with superb action. He should beat 30 easily before snow flies.

In the 235 class eight horses faced the starter. Pansy N, driven by John Hall, of Lawrenceville, won first money, with Loafar, Peter Carroll, of Truro, second, third, and Ballant, W. E. Rockwell, fourth. Button and Cushing's Pilot started in this race, but both seemed to be off. The third heat was a great race between Pansy N and Loafar, but the doubtful John landed his poney little more under the wire an inch or two ahead of the Carroll's speedy entry.

The fastest time made in the 45 class was 2.57, and in the 35 class 2.51. The judges were Frank Hall (starting judge), James Gibson and John Fudsey. See Porter is to be congratulated on his success in getting together such a fine field of horses.
