APPENDIX

Water Works Distribution System Recommendations By Board Of Fire Underwriters. Abstract From 1923 Report.

SUPPLY MAINS:-

The supply main laid from dam to reservoir is single, 6 inches in diameter and about 2 miles in length. This main is of inadequate carry-ing capacity and should be replaced by one of at least 10 inches in diameter, and to comply with standard requirements should be laid in

The supply man laid from reservoir to comtion system at Main Street near Oak Avenue is single, 8 inches in diameter and about 2,400 feet in length. This main is of adequate carrying capacity for present demand but should be laid in duplicate in order to comply with standard requirements.

DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM:-

The 8 inch main referred to is of sufficient carrying capacity to furnish water under present maximum conditions of consumption without undue friction loss, but the present arrangement of minor distributers fails to give adequate fire protection. The system is composed of about 21% of 8 inch, 14% of 6 inch and 65% of 4 inch pipe, the latter not standard and too small for hydrant supply. The 6 inch and 8 inch is laid in the principal business and congested sections. A well defined plan should be adopted whereby all 4 inch mains in the distribution system furnishing hydrant supply or forming a part of the gridiron, will be removed and replaced by mains of suitable capacity and dead ends eliminated whereever practicable. Mains in the business and congested sections should not be less than 10 inches in diameter nor less than 6 inches in other parts and always well supplied by others of larger

The distribution system should be further subdivided by the installa-The distribution system should be further subdivided by the installa-tion of additional gates, so located that no single case of accident, break-age or repair to the pipe system will necessitate the shutting from service a length of pipe greater than 500 feet in important districts, or 800 feet

VENTURI METERS:-

A venturi recording meter should be installed in the supply line at the reservoir or other suitable location between reservoir and distribu-tion system. Records from same to be carefully filed for immediate future

An automatic pressure recording gauge should be provided and attached to an independent pipe from the street main in the business district; the daily diagrams from same to be conveniently filed for immediate

All obsolete and unapproved hydrants should be replaced by others of approved make, and additional hydrants should be provided in business sections located at all intersections of streets, and not more than


