Treaty of Limerick, 1691.

The defence of Limerick is as famous in Irish history as that of Londonderry. William failed to take the place and was compelled to raise the siege. In 1691 the Dutch general, Ginkell, having defeated the Irish at Aughrim. turned his attention to Limerick. The town held out from August till October 1st, when terms were arranged for its surrender. On the above date the Treaty of Limerick was signed.

The Results of the Treaty.

The principal military articles were:-The garrison to be permitted to march out of the city with arms and baggage, drums ly. When first seen she appeared to beating and colours, flying. Those officers and soldiers who wished might go to any foreign country, the Government to provide them with ships; those who chose might join the army of William and Mary. Ginkell was anxious to keep these soldiers in the King's Army; but only 1,000 joined. More than 20,000 sad exiles—among them Sarsfield-went to Brest and entered the French service. They formed the nucleus of the famous Irish Brigade, who afterwards distinguished themselves in many a battlefield-Fontenoy, Ramillies, Blenheim, Landen, and others; always led by Irish officers, exiles like themselves. 
