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THE COLLEGE SPORTS.

The Annual Athletic Contests of the University of New Brunswick.

SPIRITED COMPETITION.

Good Sport all Round and Several New Records Established.

Remarkable Showing of Ryan, Who Took a Place in 11 Events.

Prizes Presented by Mrs. Brydson-Jack—Officials—Managing Committee

The usual number of spectators attended the U. N. B. sports which were held at the University athletic field on Saturday afternoon. Although the field and track were not in the best of condition owing to the rains of the previous night and morning the contestants were all in good form and during the afternoon succeeded in establishing several new records.

The sports, which commenced at 2:30 o'clock, continued until nearly seven in the evening, and were pronounced by those present to be a grand success in every particular. The five band of the 71st Regiment was in attendance during the afternoon and played a well selected programme of music.

Ryan, a St. John boy, fulfilled the expectations aroused when he entered the sports as a freshman last year. He proved himself an all round athlete, and was able to break several former college records. Of the thirteen events in which he was eligible to compete he entered eleven, and took a place in each in which he competed, winning eight firsts, two seconds, and one third.

He won the belt for the present year presented by the class of '90 to the best general athlete in the college as shown at the annual sports.

At the conclusion of the sports the competitors were presented with the

medals and other prizes by Mrs. E. Brydson-Jack, wife of Professor Jack; and as each came forward to receive his prize he was greeted by the college and class yells.

Professor Jack addressed the boys, congratulating them upon the successful outcome of their sports. He thought the idea of leaving a place on the programme open to the High Schools was a good one, and brought the students more in touch with the old institution on the hill and also trained those who would be future students of the U. N. B.

The officials of the day were: Referee, Dr. J. W. Bridges. Starter, Mr. J. Stewart Campbell. Judges, Messrs. J. D. Fowler, R. W. McLellan and J. H. A. Fairweather. Timers, H. C. Butler, M. Tennant and Titus J. Carter, and they performed their duties to the satisfaction of all concerned.

HORSES IN CARLETON.

The Fine Little Trade Developed in the Good Ones in the Prosperous County.

(Woodstock Dispatch.)

Alderman J. B. Hamon, of St. John, was in Carleton last Wednesday, when he bought from W. E. Glidden four fine driving horses. One, a black mare raised by Faulkner Bros., of Woodstock, was one of the finest horses that ever left Carleton County. She weighed about 1200 pounds, a beautiful driver with perfect action. It is understood that she was bought for James Manchester, of Manchester, Robertson & Allison. One was a black mare bought from Andrew Caldwell, of Landowne, and two others were bought from Mr. Shaw who owns the mill below Hartland. These horses were shipped on Thursday morning and in the same car Mr. Glidden sent three driving horses to C. B. Churchill, of Digby, N. S. One of the horses for Mr. Churchill was a bright bay gelding by Aurora, bought from A. F. Hale. This horse can trot in 2:30. The week before last Mr. Glidden sold to John R. McCornell, of Marysville, a draft horse weighing 1550 pounds. It was a bay Clyde by one of W. A. Hay's horses and was raised by John A. Agent, of River de Chute. Recently Mr. Glidden sold to John Sweeney, an undertaker at Yarmouth, N. S., a beautiful black horse for his hearse. The horse stood 16 hands high and weighed 1100 pounds. On the same day he sold a bay and a grey to George Dickinson, of Bridgetown, N. S., and a bay gelding to Bradford Lovett, of Yarmouth, N. S. All told in the last three weeks Mr. Glidden has shipped from Carleton County 21 first class horses.
