**Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations**

Any person who is the head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres of crops.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a portion of homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

**Cardinal Mercier to the Belgians.**

Lift up your hearts! Redouble your confidence. Remain calm and courageous! If you must weep, withdraw into your homes, into your churches, from what is passing outside, and ask God to send you endurance.

Cowardice is an impety. Try to see passing events as a cloud which dissolves, as a shadow which drifts away.

Have the will to forget, even for half an hour each day, and you will rise up stronger, more decided, resolute.

You are at the mercy of events instead, you ought to dominate events.

You are obeying emotion when you have the power and the duty to master emotion.

God is speaking to us Belgians. Sometimes He speaks quietly through the voices of nature—sometimes more terribly, by tempest, earthquake and war.

Our trial is long. I bear it from day to day. And there is one within our stricken country who does not share the natural sorrow.

Each historical period is a page in the Book of Providence. Today Belgium is writing its history with its blood. Only in sternly shall we be able to read each of us collaborated to make the charters golden.

The terrible events at which we are assisting are the result of pride and cupidity breaking into peaceful industry. War is inevitable so long as on earth one man is capable and guilty of rendering universal sacrifice a shiner. But if I say too little to wish to peace for the sake of peace, peace may price would be to accept with indifference, right or in justice, truth or a lie.

Whatever happens, there is something no oppressor can touch—your soul. It belongs to you; you alone are its master; therefore, endure—pray!

I have met in these last months youths and young girls of the people who dare not show themselves in public any more because they have neither good clothes nor clogs for their feet. But believe well that our divin Saviour is not like those parasites whose regard you dread. The more your state resembles His poverty, the more He loves you. For evermore Belgium must honor the poor!

Be grateful to God. Thank Him for having given us patience to support, without breaking, our long and bitter trial. Bless Him for having protected Albert, our king, the glory of the Belgian nation. Bless Him, too, for having imposed on the hearts of other people respect for our misfortunes.

Pray before all for our dear soldiers, who are kept so much at heart by the ties of blood, patriotism and gratitude!

We cannot exclude anybody from our prayers, not even our enemies. But Christian theology teaches us to graduate our affections.

Suffering has rendered us more sympathetic. Here, in occupied Belgium, let us share our sorrow with the other. May our affection be sincere and active. In returning Belgians learn that the charity of Belgium's poor to those poorer during the war deserves to be told after the heroism of Belgian soldiers.

Suffering has taught us how to sympathize. Formerly we let pass without emotion the slaughter of the poor Armenian nation; its men put to death by Mohammedan fanaticism; its women and maidens sold as slaves. Have pity on them, often pray for them.

Then noble Poland; which never undertook a war of conquest, yet always fought for the liberty of Europe and civilization. Today Poland suffers more than Belgium. Pray for Poland, my brothers, that God may grant as one of the happy results of this horrible war the definite recognition of Polish independence.

**Belgium.**

It has been learned by the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament in Yonkers, New York, that the cause of the religious of their Order martyred during the French Revolution has been introduced in Rome at the request of Monsignor Maline, and there is every hope that these holy ones who died for their attachment to God, to the Holy See and to their monastic vows will eventually be beatified.

The title of the cause is under the name of the Sister of the Blessed Sacrament, who was first to give her life for Christ, Sister Iphigenia of St. Mathieu and her Companions. Those companions of Sister Iphigenia were twelve Sisters of her own community of Bolleone and small groups of her Religious belonging to various other communities, Ursulines, Visitandines, etc., thirty-two in all. After having been torn from their respective convents, the Sisters were cast into the public jails of Orange, Vaucluse, in which city one of the most savage of the revolutionary tribunals was making innumerable victims.

The Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament had previously been convicted from their monastery of Bolleone, obliged to take off the religious habit and to rent a private house, in which they lived amid poverty and tribulation, constantly harassed by the civil authorities. Their Superior, the Venerable Mother de la Fare, sister of the noble "fighting Bishop" of Nancy, was imprisoned at Point St. Esprit; after long painful confinement the fall of Robespierre released Mother de la Fare from the very jaws of death. She was still in prison, when on May 2, 1793, the year of the Great Terror, a decree in the morning, carts were brought to the door of their temporary dwelling, and the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament were piled into them like cattle for the shambles. These pure and holy souls who had spent their days and nights in adoration before the Divine Mystery and Victim of the Altar, were to be victims, too, a "memorial of the Passion."

**Former Canadian Archbishop Honored.**

A recent number of the "Acta Apostolicae Sedis" contains a letter from the Holy Father to the Most Rev. Augustus Dottenwill, O. M. I., Titular Archbishop of Domentis, Superior-General of the Oblates of Mary Immaculate, wherein His Holiness congratulates Mrs. Dottenwill on the celebration of the centenary of the Order of which he is the head, commends the great work accomplished by the Order, especially in the conversion of the heathen, in the hundred years of its existence (which was outlined in our columns a few months ago), and appoints him a Prelate Assistant at the Pontifical Throne.

Archbishop Dottenwill, who is a native of Alsace, now sixty years of age, was for ten years on the staff of Ottawa University, going to the Pacific coast in 1889. He was made Coadjutor Bishop of the then Diocese of New Westminster in 1897, succeeding to the bishopric about two years later, and being made first Archbishop of Vancouver in 1903, which See, however, he resigned to take up his residence in Rome, upon being elected General of the Oblates in that year.

**The Dublin Review.**

According to the Tablet, London, England, the Dublin Review will hereafter be controlled by an international editorial committee. The English committee consists of Mr. Shane Leslie, Canon Barry, Father Martindale, Sir Bertram Windle, and Mr. Robert Wilberforce. In order that Catholic thought and feeling in America may be better represented the above committee will be assisted by the work of Cardinal Gibbons, the Very Reverend Dr. Fay and Mr. Schuyler Warren.

According to the Review itself, an attempt will be made, at this crisis in Christendom, to mobilize the fighting forces of Catholicism. The union that is the strength of great enterprises will be sought and found in its pages.

According to recent word, Mr. Shane Leslie, the noted writer on Irish affairs, will reside in New York City. For this reason the Dublin Review will look for a wider circulation in America.
