THE U.S. LEGION WAS DESTROYED

AMERICANS FIGHTING WITH MEXICAN REBEL ARMY WERE KILLED.

San Antonio, Texas, March 12.—A dispatch to the Press from El Paso says: "From the only American who escaped unscathed from the fight at Casas Grandes are reported, the details of the fight on Monday. The result was the extermination of the American legion of Madero's army."

40 Americans Killed.

"Of the 50 Americans leading in the attack, 40 were killed or wounded. The only survivor, Roy Kelly, of San Antonio, Pennsylvania, United States army scout in the Philippines with his clothing in rags and his body a mass of cuts, arrived in El Paso yesterday afternoon. According to Kelly, the killed include Paul Madero, brother of Francisco Madero, R. P. Harrington, Captain of the American Legion, former resident of New York City; Giuseppe Garibaldi, a grandson of Garibaldi, the Italian patriot and liberator.

"Young Garibaldi was a well known soldier of fortune. He served as a scout under the British in South Africa, and held a commission as captain in the Italian army, and has been Colonel of cavalry in Venezuela, Nicaragua, and other Central and Southern American republics."

Diaz Is Not Troubled.

Paris, March 12.—In reply to a request for an expression relative to the concentration of American troops in Texas, Porfirio Diaz, president of Mexico, replied the following message: "The Government of the United States has been careful to explain its official position on the concentration of troops on the frontier of Mexico. There is then, as the international press has already pointed out, no cause for disquietude."

Thousands Saw Battle.

Douglas, Arizona, March 12.—Thirty-five were killed or wounded in a battle at noon today when General Blanco with 5000 rebels came out of the canon east of Agua Prieta and was engaged by a Federal force of 300. The battle was spectacular and was witnessed by thousands of rebels who withdrew but are expected to attack again tonight.

To Protect Property.

Mexico City, March 12.—Thoroughly aroused by the spread of brigandage and vandalism incident to the revolution led by Francisco Madero, and determined to protect property, the Diaz Government this week will begin to wage against the lawless element a war of extermination. Resurrecting a provision of the Mexican constitution not used for fifteen years, and acting under its authority, the Government will set aside for six months certain personal guarantees. Those detected in the act of highway robbery, or robbing villages, or train wrecking or cutting telegraph or telephone wires, or removing spikes from a railroad track, or throwing a stone at a train, will be summarily shot by those making the arrest.

Yesterday, the bill providing for this drastic measure was sent to the permanent commission of the Federal Congress.

"It was signed by Miguel Madero, sub-secretary of the department of the interior, and clearly states that his enactment is the wish of the president."

130 Assassination Killed.

Mexico City, March 12.—A body of 120 insurgents was out to pieces by state rurales at San Luis Potosi yesterday, according to reports reaching here. More than fifty were killed, eleven seriously wounded and twenty-seven captured. Owing to the fact that the rurales have adopted the revolutionary tactics of ambushing their enemy, none of their number was killed and only a few wounded, reports from Chihuahua, a delayed several days in transmitting the news, a distressing state of affairs in that city of 25,000 inhabitants, owing to the closing down of some industrial establishments and the numerous short times of others. MINORS SAY THEY PURCHASED BEER

In Bar of Windsor Hotel Strathcona—License Infringement Case Continued

The license infringement case, in which George Maguire, of the Windsor Hotel, Strathcona, is charged with selling liquor to minors, was continued before Inspector Worley at the Mounted Police Barracks this morning. The evidence of James Smith and Bruce Locke was taken. Smith said that on the evening of February 17th he entered the Windsor Hotel bar with the Locke boys and bought several drinks of beer, besides purchasing a bottle of Imperial whiskey, to take with him to the bar that evening. He stated that he was under age, but Glatzer, the bar-tender, did not ask him his parents' names.

Bruce Locke corroborated Smith's evidence. He went into the bar with others and beer and a bottle of whiskey was purchased. He was twenty years old, but had never been asked his age at the bar.

The case had to be adjourned till Monday to take the evidence of Corbett, of Fort Saskatchewan, who had not been served with a summons to attend. This will close the evidence for the prosecution. It is understood that the defence has a large amount of evidence to offer.

RAISE FOR STREET CAR MEN.

Winnipeg, March 14.—The Winnipeg Electric Railway Company announced today an increase of two cents an hour for its employees and conductors. This move has come as a surprise to the men and is said to be the direct outcome of the visit of the Hon. J. H. MacKenzie.

VIOLETTE TO MAKE POWER OFFER TO CITY

Holden of Rights on Athabasca River War to be Offered to City. Council Will Consider Offer of Department of Interior For Rights to City Tonight.

Messrs. Alfred Violette, Engineer Neville and E. T. Bishop met the city commissioners yesterday in the afternoon for the purpose of forming them that Mr. Violette was prepared by reason of the water power privilege which he holds on the Athabasca river, to deliver hydro-electric power to the city at a price cheaper or as cheap as the city can develop for itself under the offer made by the department of interior.

No action was taken by the commissioners at the meeting of the city council this evening as the offer of the minister of the interior to enter into an agreement with the city to permit the development of 60,000 horse power at Grand Rapids under the conditions set down in the regulations governing water powers will be taken up. This is a matter which requires immediate action, for the offer stands only for a comparatively brief period.

EDMONTON, CALGARY AND COAST CITIES IN BIG HOCKEY LEAGUE

Formation of Hockey Circuit, Comprising Vancouver, Victoria and Two Alberta Cities Announced by Frank Patrick, of Nelson, World-Famous Player—Companies in Each City to Build Rinks—Edmonton Arena Will Have Ice Surface Equal to That of Montreal Arena—To Cost \$50,000—Artificial Ice Rinks in B.C. Cities—Half Million to Be Invested.

Vancouver, March 14.—The formation of a Western Canada Ice Hockey League, embracing Vancouver, Victoria, Calgary and Edmonton and calling for the investment of half a million in buildings and plant is announced today by Mr. Frank Patrick, of Nelson, the son of the millionaire lumberman, who has achieved fame as a player all over the Dominion. The proposition calls for artificial ice rinks in the two coast cities and natural ice rinks in the Alberta cities. Sites have been secured in Vancouver and Victoria and separate companies are being organized in each of the four cities to control the rinks there.

The artificial rink in Vancouver will be situated on the north side of Georgia street, on the site of the old Variolous Hospital, or the new Show building. The contracts for the new buildings in all four cities will be let within sixty days and there will be skating by November 1 next. It is proposed to conduct the professional baseball and hockey players available will be secured.

We expect to make this the best hockey league in the world, said Frank Patrick this morning. "There are already a number of good hockey players on the coast and we intend to procure the best in Canada. Hockey salaries in the east have been made this winter, and there will be no difficulty in bringing west all the players required to round out the four clubs in this league."

Patrick to Play Here.

As far back as last November Mr. Patrick conceived the idea of putting up an artificial ice rink in Vancouver, but he did not see how the proposition could be made to pay a legitimate interest on the capital invested until the idea of a coast league dropped up. Then it was too late to do anything for the present season, but Mr. Patrick gives the assurance that the plans have gone so far now that there is no chance of their falling through. He has arranged with Fred J. Whitcroft, the well-known hockey player who managed the Edmonton team which went after the Stanley Cup, and Mr. James McKinnon, of that city, to look after the proposition.

"We will have skating at the Vancouver and Victoria rinks by November 1st next," said Mr. Patrick today. That is assured. The hockey season will probably start in the middle of December, after the players have had plenty of time to practice."

He also gave the assurance that one of the main attentions of the department would be devoted to securing proper hotel accommodations, about which the department had received numerous complaints, particularly in the country districts.

The Calgary Blind Pigs. "Yes, we are going to stamp out a number of blind pigs in the province and we shall not be satisfied until we have exterminated them all out," Mr. Lacey stated emphatically, "including the Calgary ones."

There will be no exceptions," he stated.

With respect to the cleaning up of the country hotels, he said that the complaints about the service and sanitary conveniences had been flowing in fairly freely.

"Licenses holders must learn that besides merely keeping the liquor ordinances they have to provide a proper service too, and we shall spend some of our time in persuading them to regard things from this standpoint."

Of course, with respect to the service, we shall not expect a man who runs a \$1 a day hotel, to have as good a service as the \$3 per day man, but he is expected to keep the service up to what is charged."

"Our inspectors are busy investigating the complaints now."

"The policy of the department will be to see that the whole of the ordinances relating to the hotel and liquor trade are well observed."

The Victoria rink will be built on Mike Carlin's property on Fort street, near the exhibition grounds. The building and plant will cost \$100,000 and among those associated with the rink are Messrs. R. F. Green, Thomas Hooper, M. Carlin, John A. Turner, Harry Wright, M.L.A., and Dr. G. A. H. Hall.

Arrangements have been made both in Vancouver and Victoria with the R.C. Electric Railway Company for power. The Victoria rink will have the same ice surface as the Vancouver rink. In fact rinks in all four cities will be built on the same plans, something which will ensure better hockey all round.

Calgary and Edmonton rinks being for natural ice will not require the amount of money to build that is needed for Vancouver and Victoria, and they will only take \$50,000 each.

Mr. Patrick said that he was only in Calgary twelve hours, but during that time he was able to get the plans for the rink company well under way. He has interested a lot of prominent business men in Calgary, including Messrs. F. C. Lowe, R. G. McNeill, M. Doyle and Dr. J. L. Gibson. Mr. Patrick has not been up to Edmonton in the matter yet, but he has arranged with Fred J. John Gunn, Head of Bridge Building C.P.R. High-Level Bridge, Denies Story of Failure to Meet Conditions Experienced, and Declares Work is Making Good Progress.

John Gunn, of the firm of John Gunn & Son, who has just arrived from Winnipeg, indignantly denies the reports circulated, as to the failure of his company to adequately meet conditions in the building of the concrete substructure of the high level bridge across the Saskatchewan. On the contrary, he states the work is making good progress and, barring unforeseen contingencies, will be finished by July.

"I got on the scene yesterday," said Mr. Gunn, "and found everything in first-class shape. The foundations for the bridge piers are now in, and three of them are above high water level. The last river pier is within thirteen feet of the present water level and if nothing unforeseen happens, it will be to the present water level this week, and it will only take some three or four days to put the same pier above high water level. That will leave the two piers in midstream."

Injunction Against Council.

Winnipeg, March 13.—The council of the municipality of St. Vital was held up tonight from passing a third reading of a by-law to sign up with the Rees Engineering company for the purchase of electric light and power. Albert Dahm, representing W. T. Lewis, a citizen of St. Boniface, served an injunction on the council, restraining the final passing of the by-law. The injunction is returnable Wednesday morning before Chief Justice Mathers.

MACKENZIE MAKES OFFERS TO WINNIPEG

Will Sell out Entire Plant of Winnipeg Electric Company or Will Purchase from City 15,000 Horse-Power as Soon as it can be Delivered.

Winnipeg, March 13.—Particulars of the proposals made by Sir William Mackenzie, President of the Winnipeg Electric Railway Company, to the mayor and other representatives of the city regarding the settlement of the troubles in connection with the traction and commercial lighting matters were published today.

Two alternatives were presented to the city: (1) Company will sell its street railway gas, power and electric light plant to city at some price, or (2) The company will purchase from city 15,000 horse-power as soon as it is in position to deliver it, at a price which will pay interest on city's entire investment in municipal plant at point du Bon, on condition that the company shall be the owner of the plant and shall be entitled to sell it at any time.

One of the alterations was the sale of the plant to the city at a price of \$1,000,000. The company's proposal would be in excess of \$1,000,000. The next move is up to Mayor Byram, who has the matter in his hands. He will call a meeting of the council, which will probably be taken up with the matter.
