Brought Marconi Outfit

The wireless outfit to be installed on Job Bros. steamers, the Botic and Neptune, arrived here last evening by the Florizel. Messrs. A. H. Rau, R. Crane and D. Sarnoff, members of the American Marconi Co., came along from New York with the apparatus and will commence putting it up on the ships immediately.

Florizel Getting Ready

The Florizel will now go to the South Side to have her pounds fitted up and boy's stowed for the seal-fishery. She has on board 1,200 tons of coal, her supply for the seal-fishery. Capt. Clarke will remain here until the Rosalind arrives, will proceed in her to New York, and will then go to Glasgow to bring out the new ship Stephano, while Capt. Job Vine will pick the crew to bring out to Glasgow and will take them to the Florizel to be paid off here.

The New Service.

The s.s. Stella Maris is now being made ready to take up the coastal service between this port and Fogo, and when it is possible will sail. This is a new experiment on this season of the year and she can only do it by availing of the shifting of the winds which moves the ice off the coast in a hurry, and she may be able to make her ports of call when such opportunities offer. The vessel, however, this year will have much heavy ice to contend with and there is always the danger of being caught in the bays.
